1. The Central Bank of Myanmar has issued this proclamation exercising its authority under Sections 17 and 22 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law.
2. To increase Sino-Myanmar trade and facilitate the flow of goods, Yuan/Kyat direct payments were allowed on the Sino-Myanmar border to facilitate the two countries' payment and clearing systems and to increase domestic currency in line with the objectives of ASEAN Financial Integration.
3. Designated banks have been allowed to open yuan accounts of importers and exporters for cross-border trade.
4. Therefore, the designated banks are required to adhere to the Guidelines for the Direct Use of Yuan/Kyat in Sino-Myanmar border trade.
5. This notice shall take effect from the date of issue.


The government will provide necessary assistance for generating electricity through solar panels, says Senior General

VILLAGES need to install solar panels for generating electricity for contributing to the electricity consumption of the people as well as improvement of their living standards, said Chairman of the State Administration Council Prime Minister Senior General Min Aung Hlaing in inspecting the 30-megawatt Thabyewa solar power plant project in Thabyewa Village of Thazi Township, Mandalay Region, yesterday morning.

Chairman of Clean Power Energy Co. Ltd U Thuang Kyaing reported on the implementation of the solar power

plant project, efficient use of land plots, suspension of project and continuation, in-

stallation of machinery at the project, assistance for rural development, and feeding of

Despite high investments, generating electricity via solar panels has advantages in the short term of construction and lesser cost later. Villages need to install solar panels for generating electricity for contributing to the electricity consumption of the people as well as improvement of their living standards. Solar power can be applied for taking agricultural water. The government will provide necessary assistance for generating electricity through solar panels.

The Senior General then visited the project site and left the necessary instructions.

The 30-megawatt Thabyewa solar power plant project was implemented by Clean Power Energy (CPE) Co., Ltd. through a BOO (Build, Operate, Own) system. It was launched on 5 December to supply electricity. A total of 83,752 solar panels were installed at the plant in addition to 126 inverters and five box transformers for generating more than 200,000 kilowatt-hours per day and 70.599 million kWh per year. The electricity from the plant is fed to the national grid via Thabyewa

main station for meeting the electricity demand of the nation on one hand.

At the Flying Training Base in Meiktila, the Senior General heard reports on the implementation of the Pankhinn project in cooperation with other ministries, issuance of citizenship scrutiny cards in Mandalay Region and the interrelations between the Pankhinn project and e-ID system by Union minister U Khin Yi of the Ministry of Immigration and Population.

In his instructions, the Senior General said that citizenship scrutiny cards must be issued to all citizens born of Myanmar citizen parents. Relevant scrutiny cards must be released to those who are deserved for having citizenship and associate citizens under the 1982 Myanmar Citizenship Law. As Meiktila Township has completed issuance of the CSC to local people, accounting for more than 77 per cent, and he urged all to complete the work process as the model of the whole nation.

The Senior General viewed issuance of CSC for the people of 10 years old, change of CSC with new ones for those of 18 years old in the precinct of the monastery in Hsekon Village in Meiktila Township and urged staff to systematically store the data in a computerized system.

Hsekon Village of Myinkan village-tract in Meiktila Township is home to 959 people in 198 households. As of yesterday morning, the work procedures are being run to issue the CSC to the people under the Pankhinn project. So far, 101 people of 138 persons who need the CSC have been issued the ID, accounting for 73.18 per cent completion.

State Administration Council Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win addresses National Committee on Social Protection 1/2021 meeting

THE National Committee on Social Protection held its 1/2021 meeting yesterday. During the meeting, Vice-Chairman of the State Administration Council Deputy Prime Minister Vice-Senior General Soe Win, in his capacity as the chairman of the national committee, said the meeting is the very first one after reconstituting the National Committee on Social Protection. Social protection is an important activity for poverty alleviation and the development of human capital which is essential for the development of the country.

The “National Committee on Social Protection” was reorganized with 12 members under the SAC Notification No 14/2021 to implement the action plan of Myanmar National Social Protection Strategic Plan and social protection activities effectively.

He also added that the Union minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement leads the “Working Committee” as a chairperson to perform duties more effectively.

If it reviews the implementation of the Myanmar National Social Protection Strategic Plan issued in 2014, it shows signs of progress and there are remaining matters to be done better. The implementation of social protection funding programmes has been changed especially during the outbreak of the unexpected COVID-19 pandemic in 2020 and 2021.

During the outbreak of the pandemic, the key role of social protection activities become more significant and the committee should draw a lesson based

on the pandemic and prepare further plans to undertake proper emergency responses if the world faces such a pandemic in the future.

Currently, the Social Welfare Department develops a Social Management Information System (SMIS) and such doing is an improvement in implementing social protection procedures. The departments concerned should cooperate to effectively use the SMIS if it completes.

Moreover, the Electronic Cash Transfer will be used in providing cash assistance and it will be used as a pilot project in Ayeyawady Region and Shan State.

It is important to understand that there are success and development as well as difficulties and challenges in the field of social protection, especially during the

COVID-19 period, there are certain restrictions in conducting a ground survey, changes of plans and other COVID-19 related challenges.

Moreover, the access to long-term funding for the ongoing “cash assistance” and “social protection activities to be extended” could be a challenge, and so “a long-term funding strategy” must be drafted. The Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement starts drafting the strategic plan.

It is more important to have legal backing for the sustainability of funding programmes for social protection. Therefore, the MoSWRR, which serves the main role, should draft the social assistance law (draft) in this financial year.

The social protection activities also play a key role in the My-

anmar Sustainable Development Plan (MSDP) and they are such a practical plan for the commitment between the government and its citizens as the government is responsible to resolve the socio-economic challenges of the people.

He then highlighted the words of stone inscription by King Kyansittha at Shwezigon Pagoda “with the left hand, the king shall bring clothing while with the right he shall give rice and food like a mother care for her child so the king shall look after the people” as a guide for the social protection programmes of Myanmar nowadays.

He continued that, therefore, the “social protection activities” are the priorities of the country and that directly benefits the people, and so the ministries concerned and partner organ-

izations should work together closely for effective implementation, cooperation and fundraising programmes.

Then, Union minister Dr Thet Thet Khine of the Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement reported on the current undertaking of social protection work plans.

The Union ministers, Nay Pyi Taw Council chairman, States/Region chief ministers, deputy minister and other departmental heads clarified ongoing work plans, including future actions to be extended.

The deputy minister also reported on the drafted decisions made at National Committee on Social Protection 1/2021 meeting and the Chairman of the national committee SAC Vice-Chairman Deputy Prime Minister coordinated the discussion.— MNA

Myanmar to distribute second phase of ASEAN humanitarian assistance



THE 3rd coordination meeting of the Management Task Force of the ASEAN Humanitarian Assistance which is provided to Myanmar through the ASEAN

Coordinating Centre for Humanitarian Assistance on Disaster Management (AHA Centre) was held at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs yesterday morning.

The meeting was chaired by the Chairman of the task force Union minister for International Cooperation U Ko Ko Hlaing, and Union minister for Health Dr Thet Khaing Win, Union minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr Thet Thet Khine, who are the vice-chairpersons of the task force, and members attended the meeting.

At the meeting, Union minister U Ko Ko Hlaing said that the first phase of ASEAN humanitarian assistance was life-saving assistance for COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities. The second

phase of the assistance will start and relevant departments must coordinate more than the first phase to expand the distribution to the people in actual need.

Afterwards, Union minister Dr Thet Khaing Win said he received the first phase of the humanitarian assistance in line with the state policies and with the permission of the Central Committee for the Prevention, Control, and Treatment of COVID-19 and coordinated for the distribution. upgrading of National Indoor Stadium (1) Thuwunna.

“It was decided to renovate

the stadium for free and the project was completed and handed over today. Sport is an important symbol for social development and human development. The People's Republic of China will host the 24th Winter Olympics and the 19th Asian Games in 2022.

China attaches great importance to cooperation in sports fields between the two countries.

A sports technical assis-

tance project is being implemented for Myanmar to achieve good results at the 31st Southeast Asian Games to be held in Viet Nam in coming May, said the Ambassador.

He added that he would work with Myanmar to make bilateral cooperation and beneficial to the people of Myanmar based on the people-centred concept.

Afterwards, the ambassador and Union minister exchanged certificates of appreciation for the upgrading of National Indoor Stadium (1) Thuwunna.

Then, the Union minister said that since the opening of the stadium with a capacity of 10,825 spectators, international-level sports competitions, domestic sports tourneys and events were successfully held and it is a gymnasium that has produced national team athletes.

“We are especially proud of the generosity of the Government of the People's Republic of China and the Shanghai Construction Company for restoring the original structure of

the building without any major changes in the event of a year-long deterioration of the stadium and electrical and mechanical equipment,” the Union minister elaborated.

The project was launched on 11 August 2019 for 220 million Yuan with the help of the People's Republic of China and has been completed today.

The current stadium has been renovated within the stipulated time, leaving a milestone in Sino-Myanmar cooperation.

More than half a billion pushed into extreme poverty due to health costs

The COVID-19 pandemic is likely to halt two decades of global progress towards Universal Health Coverage, according to reports released on Sunday from the World Health Organization (WHO) and World Bank, which reveal more than half a billion people are being pushed into extreme poverty because they have to pay for health services out of their own pockets.

THE findings launched on International Universal Health Coverage Day, highlighting the devastating impact of COVID-19 on people's ability to obtain healthcare and pay for it.

In his message marking the Day, UN Secretary-General António Guterres said that with the third year of the pandemic fast approaching, "we must urgently strengthen our health systems to ensure they are equitable, resilient and capable of meeting everyone's needs, including for their mental health."

Shockwaves He added that "the shockwaves of this health emergency are hitting hardest those countries that lack health systems capable of providing quality, affordable care for all."

If the world is to reach the goal of achieving universal health coverage by 2030, there needs to be greater commitment from governments to investing in and scaling up proven solutions.

"This means making more and smarter investments in the foundations of health systems, with an emphasis on primary health care, essential services and marginalized populations",

Since the time from the reigns of ancient Rakhine kings to date, Buddhist monks and layman authors,

said Mr Guterres.

The best insurance for resilient economies and communities, is strengthening health systems before crises emerge. "The unequal distribution of COVID-19 vaccines in the past year has been a global moral failure. We must learn from this experience. The pandemic will not end for any country until it ends for every

country", said the UN chief. **Stresses and strains**

In 2020, the pandemic disrupted health services and stretched countries' health systems beyond their limits. As a result, for example, immunization coverage dropped for the first time in ten years, and deaths from TB and malaria increased, said the news release from WHO and

the World Bank.

The pandemic also triggered the worst economic crisis since the 1930s, making it increasingly difficult for people to pay for lifesaving healthcare.

"Even before the pandemic, half a billion people were being pushed (or pushed still further) into extreme poverty because of payments they made for health-

care. The organizations expect that that number is now considerably higher.

"There is no time to spare," said WHO chief Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus. "All governments must immediately resume and accelerate efforts to ensure every one of their citizens can access health services without fear of the financial consequences.

"This means strengthening public spending on health and social support, and increasing their focus on primary health care systems that can provide essential care close to home."

Faltering progress

"Prior to the pandemic, many countries had made progress. But it was not robust enough. This time we must build health systems that are strong enough to withstand shocks, such as the next pandemic and stay on course towards universal health coverage."

The new WHO/World Bank reports also warn that financial hardship is likely to become more intense as poverty grows, incomes fall, and governments face tighter fiscal constraints.

"Even before the COVID-19 pandemic struck, almost 1 billion people were spending more

than 10 per cent of their household budget on health," said Juan Pablo Uribe, Global Director for Health, Nutrition and Population, World Bank. "This is not acceptable, especially since the poorest people are hit hardest. Within a constrained fiscal space, governments will have to make tough choices to protect and increase health budgets," he added.

In the first two decades of this century, many governments had made progress on service coverage, said WHO and the World Bank.

In 2019, prior to the pandemic, 68 per cent of the world's population was covered by essential health services, such as reproductive health services; immunization services; treatment for HIV, TB and malaria; and services to diagnose and treat noncommunicable diseases like cancer, heart conditions, and diabetes.

But they had not made care more affordable. "As a result, the poorest groups and those living in rural areas are the least able to obtain health services, and the least likely to be able to cope with the consequences of paying for them."

ADB trims Asia growth forecasts as Omicron threatens economy

THE Asian Development Bank warned Tuesday that the highly mutated Omicron coronavirus variant could have a "substantial" economic impact, as it trimmed its 2021 and 2022 growth forecasts for developing Asia.

Global surge

Despite a sharp drop in infections and increased vaccination across the region stretching from the Cook Islands in the Pacific to Kazakhstan in Central Asia, the global surge in Covid-19 cases suggested "the pandemic will take time to play out", it said.

The Philippines-based lender forecast growth of 7.0 per cent in 2021 — compared with its previous prediction in September of 7.1 per cent — and 5.3 per cent in 2022, down from its earlier

forecast of 5.4 per cent.

While the region was expected to sustain a "strong rebound" and keep inflation at manageable levels, the emergence of Omicron had brought "additional uncertainty", the ADB said.

"Recent developments in Europe show that extensive virus outbreaks can occur even in highly vaccinated countries and force governments to retighten mobility restrictions," it said.

"As it (Omicron) appears to be significantly more transmissible than earlier variants, its economic impact could be substantial."

Across developing Asia

Vaccination rates have increased across developing Asia in recent months, with nearly half of the population fully

protected against Covid-19 at the end of November, compared with less than a third at the end of August, the lender said.

That has enabled many economies to start reopening, boosting manufacturing activity and trade in the region.

But coverage remained uneven — 20 economies still have less than 40 per cent of their populations fully vaccinated, "leaving them susceptible to renewed outbreaks".

And the region still lagged the nearly 60 per cent coverage in the United States and more than 67 per cent in the European Union.

"New pandemic waves could reverse the current reopening trend in many economies owing to still-insufficient vaccination coverage," the ADB warned.

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 527,274 after 363 new cases were reported on 14 December 2021 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, 503,790 have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll reached 19,193 after 5 died.—MNA

MoC oversees daily import of anti COVID-19 equipment

THE Ministry of Commerce is overseeing the import of essential medical supplies plus anti-COVID devices that are critical to the COVID-19 prevention, control and treatment activities, including liquid oxygen and oxygen cylinders, through trading posts, international airports and seaports.

Anti-COVID-19 equipment was imported by five companies using 21 vehicles. A total of 2,380 empty oxygen cylinders, 11,540 PPE suits, six tonnes of gloves and 134 tonnes of masks were imported via the Chinshwehaw trade zone

and international seaports yesterday.

Officials from the relevant departments are cooperating to facilitate and expedite the standard operating procedures, including online registration for the import process.

About 12.57 mln people fully vaccinated against COVID-19 in Myanmar till 7 Dec

ABOUT 12.57 million people in Myanmar have been fully inoculated against COVID-19 until 7 December, according to a release from the Ministry of Health.

The country is providing vaccines to 36.9 million people aged 18 and above. As of 7 December, there were 12.57 million people who had received two doses of the vaccine and 5.59 million people who had received one dose, over 18.17 million in total, according to the Ministry of Health.

About 35 per cent of the

country's population has been jabbed against the COVID-19 vaccine. Then, the country announced a goal to vaccinate 50 per cent of the country's population by the end of this year and 70 per cent of the population by the mid-2022.

Earlier, those above 65 years old were in the priority group to be vaccinated. Now, the priority lists for COVID-19 jabs have been increased and the lists include people above 55 years of age. Besides, COVID-19 vaccines have

been provided to above 45 years starting from 17 October and to above 40 starting from 9 November, according to the ministry.

Myanmar launched the COVID-19 inoculation programme in January 2021 across the country.

The ministry also urged people should receive the full dose of the vaccine and those who have received the first dose to visit the nearest immunization location or near the scheduled date for the second dose. — Aye Maung/GNLM

Nearly 260,000 people in NyaungU district inoculated against COVID-19

A total of 259,794 people in NyaungU district, Mandalay Region, have been vaccinated against COVID-19 as of 14 December, according to the NyaungU District Administration Body.

At 24 vaccination sites in NyaungU Township and Kyaukpadaung Township, a total of 115,614 doses of both Sinopharm and Sinovac COVID-19 vaccines have been administered in NyaungU Town-

ship and 144,180 doses of the vaccines in Kyaukpadaung Township, respectively.

It is reported that the vaccination will continue depending on the availability of the vaccines and mobile COVID-19 immunization teams are also carrying out the inoculation in remote villages, according to U Toe Lwin, Chairman of the NyaungU District Administration Body. — Ko Htein (KPD)/GNLM

Press release issued on strong condemnation of terrorist acts of CRPH, NUG and PDF terrorist groups



Two security personnel died of landmine explosion in Taze

TWO security personnel who returned from Taze, Sagaing Region, after maintaining the situation of Ywathaya village where PDF terrorists set fire on houses and killed villagers, were assassinated in a landmine attack with several others being wounded.

According to the report on PDF terrorists who came to and blocked the village, killing villagers and burning their houses at around 4 pm on 13 December, a joint security task force went to the village to inspect the situation. Four village houses were burned down; one man (under investigation) was found dead with

burn injuries; four men (under investigation) were found dead with bullet wounds and one man was injured. The villages were reportedly fleeing the village to escape the terrorists.

After maintaining the situation in the village, security personnel brought the wounded man for medical treatment and returned from the village by car. By the time they arrived near Hmanyin village, PDF terrorists detonated a landmine, killing two security troops and injuring several others.

The wounded security troops were taken to the hospital to re-

Toyota sets global EV sales target of 3.5 mil. in 2030

TOYOTA Motor Corp. said Tuesday it aims to sell 3.5 million electric vehicles globally in 2030 as it builds momentum in its push for attaining carbon neutrality.

The Japanese automaker said it is ready to invest 8 trillion yen (\$70 billion) on electrified cars by 2030, and launch 30 EV models globally by that year.

“The situation around energy differs from region to region.

Therefore, Toyota wants to meet the situation and needs of different countries and regions by offering various choices in terms of carbon neutrality,” President Akio Toyoda said at a press briefing.

Toyota had said earlier that out of the 8 million electrified cars it aims to sell by 2030, 2 million would be battery electric vehicles and fuel cell vehicles.

The world’s largest automaker by volume will

also increase its investment in battery development to 2 trillion yen from 1.5 trillion yen announced earlier, Toyoda added.

The announcement comes as automakers worldwide are transitioning toward electrified cars to play their part in global efforts to reduce carbon dioxide emissions.

Toyota has worked toward establishing a “full lineup” of electrified vehicles, including EVs and hybrids as well

as fuel cell vehicles that run on hydrogen, saying it wants to offer different options to customers. But the approach has drawn flak at times as being pessimistic toward the development of EVs.

“We are serious about BEVs and (fuel cell hybrid vehicles). We are also serious about hybrid vehicles. We are still serious about gasoline vehicles,” Toyoda said, stressing his business policy has been consistent.—Kyodo ■

NatWest fined nearly £265 million in money laundering case

NATWEST was on Monday fined nearly £265 million (\$350 million, 310 million euros) for breaching Britain’s laws on money laundering, the financial regulator said.

A judge imposed the penalty after the bank admitted offences relating to a customer’s deposit of £365 million, some of which was brought in cash to a branch in bin bags.

The bank, part of the Royal Bank of Scotland group, pleaded guilty to three offences under the Money Laundering Regulations 2007 in October.


The offences were committed between November 2012 and June 2016. Imposing the fine at a court hearing in south London, judge Sara Cockerill also ordered NatWest to pay \$4.2 million in costs and made a £460,000 confiscation order.

“Throughout the indictment period, it is accepted NatWest sought to discharge its obligations under the regulations and that it failed to do so,” she said. “It is not suggested there has been any deliberate flouting of the rules or any criminal intent.”—AFP ■

ICONIC motorcycle maker Harley-Davidson announced Monday it will take its electric motorcycle division public through a merger with a special purpose company.

The transaction will combine LiveWire, the electric unit of Harley-Davidson, with AEA-Bridges Impact, establishing an entity valued a \$1.8 billion, according to a joint press

Known for its signature growling motorcycles, Harley-Davidson launched its electric division a decade ago to appeal to younger, more environmentally-conscious consumers at a time when its legacy clientele was aging.

First established in 1903 in the Northern state of Wisconsin, the company established LiveWire as a

separate division in 2019. The electric model has been available since the end of that year, and start at around \$30,000.

Taking the unit public will raise \$545 million to enable LiveWire to accelerate its production and distribution plan and invest in new product development.

“By building on Harley-Davidson’s 118-year lineage, LiveWire’s mission is to be the most desirable electric motorcycle brand in the world,” said Harley-Davidson Chief Executive Jochen Zeitz.

Zeitz plans to stay on as chief executive of LiveWire for up to two years after the transaction closes, according to the announcement. Harley-Davidson will hold 74 per cent of the new company.—AFP ■

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Myanmar's foreign trade value drops by nearly \$322 mln in mini-budget year

MYANMAR'S foreign trade value has seen a decrease by nearly US\$322 million over the past two months of the current mini-budget period as both export and import decline, according to the official report of the Ministry of Commerce.

From 1 October to 26 November in the 2021-22 financial year, the foreign trade value was \$4.309 billion, whereas the same period of the last FY saw \$4.632 billion. This year saw a drop of over \$321.862 million compared to the same period of last year.

This mini-budget year, the export value was over \$2.206 billion with a decline of over \$113 million, while the import value hit \$2.102 billion with a decrease of over \$208 million.

Myanmar exports agricultural products, animal products, minerals, forest products, and finished industrial goods, while it imports capital goods, raw industrial materials, CMP raw materials and consumer goods. According to the annual data released by the commerce

ministry, the country's foreign trade value was \$18,045.929 million in the 2012-2013FY, \$27,714.826 million in the 2015-2016FY, \$29,209.607 million in the 2016-2017FY, \$33,578.052 million in the 2017-2018FY, \$18,728.815 million in the 2018 mini-budget year and \$35,147.012 million in the 2018-2019FY.

Agro-based food production, textile and clothing, industry and electronics, fisheries production, forestry production, digital production and services, logistics services, quality management, trade information services and innovation and entrepreneurship sectors are the main priority areas of the National Export Strategy (NES) 2020-25. — ACM/GNLM

1,700 companies struck off register due to AR absence in past five months: DICA



All overseas corporations must submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending, as per Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

A total of 1,700 companies was struck off the register in the past five months (July-November) as they fail to submit an annual return (AR) on the online registry system, MyCO, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA).

The DICA has notified any registered company which fails to submit its AR on MyCO are to be suspended, under section 430 (F) of Myanmar Companies Law, according to the DICA's notification.

All registered companies need to file AR on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation, and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the incorporation), according to Section 97

of the law.

According to Section 266 (A) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017, public companies must submit annual returns and financial statements (G-5) simultaneously.

All overseas corporations must submit ARs in the prescribed format on MyCO within 28 days of the financial year ending, as per Section 53 (A-1) of the Myanmar Companies Law 2017.

As per DICA's report, more than 16,000 companies were suspended for failing to submit AR forms within the due date. Newly established companies are required to submit ARs within two months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

The DICA has notified that

any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000.

If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the register, according to the DICA notice.

The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018, keeping in line with the Myanmar Companies Law 2017. The number of companies registered on the online registry system, MyCO, topped more than 6,900 in the past 11 months of this year. Earlier, MyCO received more than 1,000 applications from new companies every month.

At present, 100 per cent of the applicants are using the online registration platform, according to data provided by the DICA. — GNLM

Black gram price down by K100,000 per tonne within two weeks

THE price of black gram (urad called in India) significantly fell by over K100,000 per tonne within two weeks, according to the Yangon Region Chambers of Commerce and Industry (Bayintnaung Wholesale Centre).

The black gram fetched only K1,307,000 per tonne in the domestic market on 14 December, whereas it touched a high of K1,425,000 per tonne (FAQ/RC) on 1 December.

The supply of the newly harvested beans is attributed to the price drop. Furthermore, the black grams will be harvested in January as well. Consequently, the price is turning to a downside.


The pulses price is directly related to the international market so the price will fluctuate following the exchange rate. The prices of beans are unlikely to fall this month.

The rumours of the issuance of new currency notes (K20,000 and K50,000) shook up the local forex market. The exchange rate slightly rose from K1,880 on 8 De-

cember to above K1,900 on 9 December. Kyat weakening against the dollar will also cause the price to increase.

Last September, the prices hit an all-time high of K2 million per tonne tracking Kyat weakening against the US dollar in the local forex market when the black gram was highly demanded by the foreign trade partners.

Over 88,328 tonnes of black grams with an estimated value of US\$77.5 million were shipped to the foreign trade partners as of 19 November in the current mini-budget period (October 2021-March 2022). Myanmar conveyed US\$1.57 billion worth of over 2 million tonnes of various pulses to foreign trade partners last financial year 2020-2021. The country shipped 1.24 million tonnes of pulses and beans valued at \$966.4 million to foreign markets through the sea route and a \$604.3 million value of 786,920 tonnes were sent to the neighbouring countries through the land borders. — NN/GNLM

Russia vetoes UN resolution on climate change as global security threat

RUSSIA on Monday vetoed a Security Council resolution formally linking climate change and global security that was supported by a majority of UN member states.

Backed by Niger and Ireland, the draft resolution called on Secretary-General Antonio Guterres to “integrate climate-related security risk as a central component into com-

prehensive conflict-prevention strategies.”

The text won support from 12 of the Council’s 15 members.

China abstained, while India voted against, arguing that

global warming was chiefly an issue related to economic development, rather than international security.

The resolution had called on the UN chief to report within two years “on the security implications” of climate change on issues addressed by the Security Council, and sought recommendations on how these risks could be addressed.

For diplomats speaking on condition of anonymity, Russia’s opposition was hard to understand given that the resolution itself “was not radical”, according to one of them.

The US ambassador to the UN, Linda Thomas-Greenfield, said there was “no justification” for Moscow’s veto.

“The climate crisis is a security crisis,” she said.—AFP ■

French soldiers lower flag after years in Mali’s Timbuktu

FRENCH troops were preparing to leave the Malian city of Timbuktu on Tuesday, in a symbolic departure more than eight years after Paris first intervened in the conflict-torn Sahel state.

It was there that then French president Francois Hollande formally declared the start of France’s military intervention, in February 2013, designed to root out jihadist insurgents.

A few days prior, French legionnaires and Malian troops had liberated Timbuktu, a northern desert city, after an eight-month Islamist occupation.

“Some people were overcome by emotion, women were crying, young people were shouting, I myself was overwhelmed,” said Yehia Tandina, a Timbuktu television journalist, recalling the day.

Mohamed Ibrahim, the for-

mer president of the Timbuktu regional council, also described the day as “joyful” and “beautiful”.

But now French troops

are leaving their base in Timbuktu, raising questions about the future of jihadist activity as militants put down roots in the countryside.—AFP ■

No US troops to be punished over deadly Kabul drone strike

THE Pentagon said Monday that no US troops or officials would face disciplinary action for a drone strike in Kabul in August that killed 10 Afghan civilians, including seven children.

Spokesman John Kirby said Secretary of Defence Lloyd Austin had received a high-level review of the strike that made no recommendation of accountability.

“He approved their recommendations,” Kirby said. “The secretary is not... calling for additional accountability measures.”

“There was not a strong

enough case to be made for personal accountability,” Kirby added. The August 29 drone strike took place in the final days of the US-led evacuation of Kabul after the Taliban seized control of the country.

US officials said they had intelligence of a possible Islamic State attack on the evacuation operations at Kabul airport, and launched a missile from a drone at a target that was thought to be a car laden with munitions.

In fact, they struck a family that included an Afghan man who worked for a US aid group and seven children.—AFP ■

Iran losing ‘precious time’ with nuclear stance: European diplomats

IRAN’S positions in talks over its nuclear development programme are “inconsistent” with the terms of the deal to limit it, diplomats from the western European countries negotiating with Tehran, said on Monday.

After a five-month pause, talks resumed on salvaging the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action (JCPOA) in Vienna on 29 November.

The 2015 agreement aimed to prevent Iran from developing an atomic bomb, a goal Tehran has always denied. The deal ensured sanctions relief in return for tight curbs on Iran’s nuclear programme, which was put under extensive UN monitoring.

Diplomats from Iran, Britain, China, France, Germany and Russia, the signatory countries to the 2015 agreement, are attending the current talks.— AFP ■

Solomon police arrest opposition party figure

POLICE in the restive Solomon Islands said Tuesday they had arrested a leading member of the opposition in connection with deadly riots that rocked the country last month.

United Party president John Kwaita was reportedly arrested by armed police at his home late Monday on unspecified charges.

“We can confirm that a prominent Solomon Islander has been arrested yesterday evening in relation to the rioting,” a police spokesman told AFP.

Late last month anti-government protests sparked widespread looting and arson in the capital Honiara, causing US\$67 million worth of damage and leaving the city’s Chinatown district in ruins.

At least three people died in the violence, which also caused the snap deployment of around 200 peacekeepers from Australia, Fiji, New Zealand and Papua New Guinea.

The protests were sparked by opposition to veteran Prime Minister Manasseh Sogavare, who is keen to forge closer ties with Beijing.— AFP ■

The ASEAN Suzuki Cup Group A matches continued on 14 December, with the victories of Thailand and Sin-

gapore securing the three-point score each, while the Myanmar team said good-bye to the group stage.

On the fourth day of the group, Thailand beat the Philippines 2-1, and Singapore beat Timor-Leste 2-0 and secured the Semi-final spot each.

Myanmar and the Philippines

teams, who had 3 points in 3 matches and Timor-Leste, who have not scored in the last four games, have been knocked out of the group stage.

The final day of Group A will be played on 18 December. The match between Thailand and Singapore will be played for the first place in the group

and the match between Myanmar and the Philippines will be played for dignity.

The Myanmar team has reached the semi-finals only twice in the history of Suzuki in 2004 and 2016 and has been knocked out of the group stages in the rest of the competition. — Ko Nyi Lay/GNLM

Man Utd's clash at Brentford postponed after Covid outbreak

MANCHESTER United's English Premier League match at Brentford was postponed Tuesday after a Covid-19 outbreak closed the Old Trafford club's training facility. The Premier League took the decision to postpone "based on guidance from medical advisors", said a Manchester United statement issued late Monday.

The decision comes after United became the latest top-flight team to be hit by a coronavirus outbreak, which forced

the closure of their Carrington training complex. The Premier League reported 42 new Covid-19 cases on Monday – a record since testing figures started being released in May 2020. Also on Monday United halted first-team operations at Carrington for 24 hours after several players and staff tested positive for the virus.

Ralf Rangnick's squad had not travelled to London.

Aston Villa and Brighton also revealed positive tests on Monday

as the virus threatened to wreak havoc on the midweek fixture list.

"Manchester United can confirm that our Premier League fixture at Brentford FC, on Tuesday 14 December at 19:30, has been postponed and will be rescheduled in due course," a United statement said. "Following PCR confirmation of positive LFT Covid-19 tests among the first-team staff and players, the outbreak requires ongoing surveillance.

Barcelona to play Napoli in Europa League knockout play-offs

BARCELONA will face Napoli in the Europa League knockout round play-off stage after the Catalan giants crashed out in the Champions League group stage for the first time since the 2000-01 season.

Xavi Hernandez's Barca will continue their European campaign in the second-tier competition, with the winner of their tie with Napoli advancing

to the last 16.

"Napoli are a great team of real European pedigree. They've got a lot of experience so we're aware it's going to be really hard," said Barca director of football Mateu Alemany.

"Obviously the draw hasn't been very generous to us but that's how these competitions are."

The first leg will take place

at the Camp Nou on February 17 with the return on February 24 at the Diego Armando Maradona Stadium in Naples. The late Argentine great played for both Barca and Napoli during his career.

Napoli and Barca met in the last 16 of the 2019/20 Champions League, with Barca advancing 4-2 on aggregate. — AFP ■
