in rural areas.

In addition to lacquerware-making, jaggery and salt making, fish paste, dried fish and fish sauce making, the weaving of various garments gradually expanded. However, domestic handicrafts declined during British rule in Myanmar. However, since independence, the government and the people have worked together to develop domestic crafts.

As Myanmar relies on agriculture, farmers' handicrafts provide additional income for agriculture, and with 75 per cent of Myanmar's population living in rural areas, only domestic handicrafts improve their livelihoods.

As these handicrafts do not

require a lot of capital, unlike large factories, the people will be comfortable only if these small businesses flourish in a country with a shortage of capital. People nowadays are engaged in handicrafts and livestock farming, brick business, pottery, charcoal business, salt business, umbrella business, leather business, cane business, soap business, and edible oil business.

Some are being operated using modern equipment. However, weaving, making baskets, production of various mats and pottery are still seen as traditional Myanmar handicrafts in rural areas. — Zeya Htet (Minbu)/GNLM

95 new cases of COVID-19 reported on 6 April, total figure rises to 612,079

MYANMAR'S COVID-19 positive cases rose to 612,079 after 95 new cases were reported on 6 April 2022 according to the Ministry of Health. Among these confirmed cases, 590,464 have been discharged from hospitals. Death toll reached 19,434 after 1 died.

COVID-19 vaccine is being injected to those of priority groups in regions and states for prevention and control of the disease. Up to 5-4-2022, a total of 27,425,323 people have been vaccinated. Of them, 22,023,688 people have been fully vaccinated, 5,401,635 people are yet to get the second shots and 1,130,699 people have received booster vaccines. -MNA

HE KG+9 education system adopted as a new educational policy by the State Administration Council will last for 12

The system is implemented for five years at the primary school level from KG to grade 5, four years at the middle school level from grades 6 to 9 and three years at the high school level from grades

Why we must act now to keep humans and the planet healthy

■ H e COVID-19 pandemic has exposed the inequitable and unsustainable systems in which people in the South-East Asia Region and across the world live and work, consume and exist. Globally, over 90 per cent of people breathe unhealthy air, resulting in around seven million deaths every year, including around 2.4 million in the Region. Food systems that are unsafe, unhealthy and unsustainable cause millions of premature deaths annually, primarily from noncommunicable diseases (NCDs), and are

a leading contributor to climate change and antimicrobial resistance - two of the greatest health risks facing humanity.

In 2020 around one in four

people globally lacked safely

managed drinking water in their homes, and just 50 per cent of health care facilities in least-developed countries provided basic water services. Poor quality drinking water can lead to acute waterborne disease and risks of exposure to toxic chemicals such as arsenic. Inadequate access to water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) in healthcare facilities makes health care less effective and has a disproportionate impact on women and girls. In total, WHO estimates that more than 13 million deaths around the world each year are due to avoidable environmental causes - a figure that we cannot and must not accept.

We have before us a oncein-a-century opportunity to drive transformative, lasting change. While the COVID-19 crisis has highlighted the inequitable and unsustainable nature of existing

political, social and commercial decisions, it has shown that if decision-making is transparent, evidence-based and inclusive, people will support bold and far-reaching policies that protect their health, their families and livelihoods. It has shown that by prioritizing equitable health now and for future generations - including through Second, invest in essential long-term investments, well-being services, from water and sani budgets, social protection, legal and fiscal strategies – we can build "well-being societies" that facilitate human flourishing and

breaching ecological limits. To achieve a Region and world in which clean air, water and food are available to all, where economies promote physical and mental health and well-being, where cities are liveable, and where people have control over their health and the health of the planet, together we must address five priorities.

First, protect and preserve the source of human health: nature. Policies that reduce deforestation, promote afforestation, and end intensive and polluting agricultural practices improve air quality, strengthen food systems, and promote sustainable farming and forest management. They reduce the risk of emerging infectious diseases, over 60 per cent of which originate from animals, mainly from wildlife.

tation to clean energy in health care facilities. Countries of the Region must continue to protect drinking-water supplies by implementing multisectoral water safety plans and including WASH in relevant health policies, strategies, and programmes, focusing on increasing access at the primary healthcare level. In line with the Region's 2017 Malé Declaration, countries must continue to build climate-resilient health facilities that respond to and withstand environmental health threats and promote environmentally sustainable practices.

Third, ensure a quick and healthy energy transition. Globally, two-thirds of exposure to outdoor air pollution results from the burning of the same fossil fuels that are driving climate change, which between 2030 and 2050 is expected to cause an additional 250,000 deaths annually. While countries of the Region have made commendable efforts to expand renewable energy sources, increased action is needed, and must be accompanied by rigorous enforcement of air quality standards, as well increased investments in public transportation infrastructure.

Fourth, promote healthy and sustainable food systems. In all countries of the Region, WHO will continue to support countries to identify and implement high-impact and cost-effective "best buys" that transform the food environment, from food reformulation and labelling to increased taxation of unhealthy foods and beverages marketing, especially to children.

Fifth, build healthy, liveable cities. In 2021, five cities in the Region were selected to participate in the WHO Urban Governance for Health and Well-being initiative, which aims to strengthen the country's capacities to promote health and address health inequities through multisectoral action. By asking just two examples, policymakers can expand cycleways and increase the provision of green and healthy spaces to reduce greenhouse emissions and road traffic injuries, increase physical activity, and promote mental health.

"The new Law on Investment, the Cambodia-China and Cambodia-Republic of Korea free trade agreements and the

Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership are expected to help boost investment and trade in the coming years," the World Bank's East Asia and Pacific Economic Update said. The RCEP is a mega trade pact between 10 member states of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) and its trade partners, namely China, Japan, South Korea, Australia and New Zealand. The RCEP and the Cambodia-China FTA entered into force on 1 Jan 2022, while the Cambodia-Republic of Korea FTA is expected to take effect in the near future. —Xinhua ■

Spain reports large-margin increase of tourists in February

SPAIN welcomed 3.15 million tourists in February of this year as the tourist industry continues to recover from the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic, said the Spanish Statistical Office (INE) on Monday.

The number of foreigners visiting Spain increased by 1,007.8 per cent when compared with February 2021, when many travel restrictions were still in place due to the pandemic.

Spending also rose strongly, with visitors spending a total of 3,757 million euros in the month, which was 1,060.2 per cent

EBRD suspends Russia and Belarus funds access over war

Europe's development bank announced Monday the immediate suspension of access to financing and expertise for both Russia and Belarus in the wake of the Ukraine invasion.

"The European Bank for Reconstruction and Development (EBRD) is moving ahead with its plans to exclude the Russian Federation and Belarus from receiving funding for projects," the lender said in a statement.

"The EBRD board of governors have approved taking firm action against the Russian Federation and Belarus following the invasion of Ukraine. "Access by the Russian Federation and Belarus to the resources of the Bank is to be formally suspended with immediate effect." The EBRD reserves the right to suspend or cancel all further disbursements for existing investment projects.—AFP

Over K25 bln spent on rural electrification projects in 25 off-grid villages in Myeik District



Solar-powered mini-grids are bringing green electricity in 25 villages in three townships, Myeik District, Taninthayi Region, spending over K25 billion.

SOLAR-POWERED mini-grids are bringing green electricity in 25 villages in three townships, Myeik District, Taninthayi Region, spending over K25 billion, said U Aung Kyaw Oo, head of

Myeik District Rural Development Department.

That off-grid rural electrification project is to cover remote rural areas. The solar-powered mini-grids will electrify 25 villages in Palaw Township, Taninthayi Region, including a solar power system for homes.

"The department is implementing an off-grid rural electrification project in the villages,

which is more than ten miles away from the national grid, and it is hard to get electricity access in 15 years. Solar home system for a small community and mini-grid electrification for cramped houses and large communities. There are 25 projects in Myeik District, with 15 in Kyunsu Township, seven in Palaw Township and three in Taninthayi Township," U Aung Kyaw Oo continued.

To carry out the project, K1 billion will be allocated for each village. The government contributes 60 per cent of the fund, while the authorized company pays 20 per cent and the rural community gives the remaining in instalments. The mini-grid power system will cost K400 per unit for home and K500 per unit for industrial use. Over the K25 billion project will generate 3.0798 MW in 25 villages in the district. This project aims to electrify

the off-grid villages in 2030," he continued.

Between the 2016-2017 financial year and 2020-2021 FY, 23 out of 25 rural electrification projects have been completed in Taninthayi Region. The two projects in Singaung village in Taninthayi Township and Thechaung village in Kyunsu town are still being undertaken. They are slated to complete at the end of May 2022. Once the project finishes, 8,760 households will get electricity access.

Myeik District Rural Development Department will proceed to 302 villages which meet the rural electrification project criteria in the coming years. The feasibility study of the mini-grid project in those villages is underway. The projects will continue depending on the allocated fund and the investments, U Aung Kyaw Oo explained. — Myint Oo (Myeik)/GNLM

Illegal timbers, foodstuffs, utensils, electronics, unregistered motorbikes, vehicles seized

MANAGED by the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee, action is being taken against illegal trades under the law.

On 4 April, the port on-duty inspection team led by the Department of Customs carried out inspections at the Myanmar Industrial Port Container Inspection Station, and electronics and utensils worth estimated at K174,025,640, imported in violation of import licences, were seized. The action was taken under the Customs Law.

Similarly, the inspection team under the management of the Yangon Region Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force carried out inspections. It seized foodstuffs worth estimated at K15,285,600 that did not show any official documents with two vehicles worth estimated K18,000,000 in Hlegu township, and action was taken under the Customs Law.

Similarly, the inspection team under the management of the Yangon Region Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force carried out inspections and seized 400 empty gas cylinder worth estimated at K4,800,000, imported in violation of import licences, and 10 motorbikes without licences worth estimated at K26,300,000 with a truck worth estimated value of K15,000,000 in Hlegu Township, totally estimated at K79,385,600 and action is taken under the

Customs Law.

On 5 April, a combined inspection team led by the regional Forest Department carried out inspections. It seized 15.179 tonnes of illegal timbers worth estimated at K1,062,530 with two six-wheel trucks worth estimated value of K60,000,000, totalling K61,062,530 and action is taken under the Forest Law.

Likewise, the inspection team led by the Forest Department under the management of the Ayeyawady Region Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force carried out inspections. It seized 43.9654 tonnes of illegal timbers worth estimated value of K3,134,648 in Thabaung, Yekyi, Nyaungdon and





Myanaung townships and action is taken under the Forest Law.

A combined inspection team led by the Forest Department under the management of the Bago Region Anti-Illegal Trade Task Force carried out inspections. It seized 2.630 tonnes of illegal teak worth estimated at K394,500 in the Khabaung forest reserve in Toungoo District, and action is prosecuted under the Forest Law.

On 6 April, 4.4720 tonnes of illegal timbers worth estimated value of K3,452,800 in Toungoo and Thayawady Districts, totalling K3,847,300, were seized, and action is prosecuted under the Forest Law. Therefore, 21 arrests (estimated value of K321,455,718) were made on 4,5 and 6 April, according to the Anti-Illegal Trade Steering Committee. — MNA

Ecstasy tablets worth K740 million confiscated in Bago Region

OVER 493,350 ecstasy tablets worth K740 million were seized in Phayagyi Town, Bago Region, according to the Myanmar Police Force.

Action on a tip-off, a combined team comprising members of Anti-Drug Squad searched a NISSAN MURANO vehicle driven by Myo Myint together with Sai Than Htut and Myo Zaw Aung on board near the Shwethanlwin Tollgate on the Bago-Mawlamyine Road in Bago Township, Bago Region in the evening of 4 April, and the police found and confiscated 493,350 ecstasy pills worth K740 million on board. After the investigation, the ecstasy pills were carried to Kayin State from Mandalay Region. Legal action is taken against the arrestees. Police continue to investigate to arrest the rest in connection with the case.

Fish auction market in Myeik slated to complete in 2028

A proposal to establish a fish auction market, with an estimated capital of US\$300 million, in the Sandawut village-tract in Myeik Township, Taninthayi Region, was given the green light, and the project is slated to be complete in 2028.

Taninthayi Region is mainly relying on fishery business. Myanmar's fishery products are primarily sent to Thailand. The project aims for the fish market, which meets international standards, to emerge.

"The project is scheduled to finish in 2028. It will employ more than ten thousand jobs for the locals," a director of Myeik Public Corporation elaborated.

The project term is seven years, and it will be established in four phases. It will give thou-

sands of job opportunities to the local community. A director added that the project would include a fishing port, cold storage, processing factories, accommodation and facility, and extended areas.

Taninthayi Region saw exports of 300,000 tonnes of fish-

ery products in the 2019-2020 Financial Year, generating an income of \$347.51 million, said an official of the Fisheries Department.

U Han Htoo Aung, in charge of the fish auction market project, said that the project was permitted by the authorities concerned, and it is likely to start in 2022 if the ministries are concerned to give the goahead to it. The project cannot be carried out in the coming rainy season as the extreme weather might cause delay and wreak havoc on the project.

When the fish auction market meets international standards emerge, those Myanmar migrant workers in Thailand, who are engaged in the fishery sector, might come back home.

Myanmar ships over 1.4 mln MT of rice in past mini-budget period

The prices of low-grade white rice varieties were approximately US\$340-355 per MT, depending on the different sorts and quality.

MYANMAR delivered more than 1.4 million metric tons of rice and broken rice in the past mini-budget period (October 2021-March 2022), according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

Myanmar has exported rice to more than 27 foreign markets, mainly to China.

Meanwhile, Myanmar shipped broken rice primarily to China, followed by the Netherlands, Belgium, Spain, France and three other countries.

The rice and broken rice exports volume stood at over 216,375 MT in October 2021, 285,223 MT in November, 301,033.9 MT in December, and 269,215.9 MT in January 2022, 214,335 MT in February and 133,972 MT in March, respectively, MRF's data showed.

The prices of low-grade white rice varieties were approximately US\$340-355 per MT, depending on the different sorts and quality. The export price of Myanmar's rice was relatively lower than the rates of Thailand and Viet Nam. Yet, the prices were higher than those of market prices of India and Pakistan, MRF's data showed. At present, the exporters will suffer losses due to the Central Bank of Myanmar's policy changes.

The Foreign exchange earned by locals in Myanmar must be deposited in accounts at the authorized banks and exchanged for the local currency at the CBM's reference rate of K1.850.

At present, traders carry out maritime trade for rice export as COVID-19 restrictions hinder the trading activity through the border posts. Myanmar shipped rice and broken rice to China, regional countries and European Union countries through maritime trade.

Rice worth K43,000-K50,000

per bag is highly demanded in the domestic market. The prices of high-grade rice move in the range of K34,500-K58,000 per bag, Bayintnaung Rice Wholesale Centre's price data indicated. Next, the prices of low-grade rice varieties are relatively high in the export market as well, ranging from K25,000 to K27,500 per 108-pound bag.

Myanmar generated over \$800 million from rice exports in the Financial Year 2019-2020 ended 30 September, with an estimated volume of over 2.5 million tonnes. Myanmar generated US\$700.13 million in income from exports of 1.87 million tonnes of rice and broken rice in the past FY2020-2021 (October-September) amidst the border trade disruption triggered by the COV-ID-19 negative consequences, as per the statistics released by the Customs Department. — KK/GNLM

CBM policy change impacts on black gram prices

AFTER the Central Bank of Myanmar notified that foreign exchange deposits must be converted into local currency at its reference rate of K1,850 and India extended the import deadline, the prices of black gram (urad called in India) have decreased.

On 29 March, India released a statement about extending of the import deadline. The price of black gram fell from K1.5 million to K1,430,000 per tonne on 6 April, with a sharp drop of over K67,000 per tonne within ten days.

India extended relaxations of conditions regarding clearance consignment for black gram (urad called in India) and pigeon pea until 31 March 2023. Following that, the prices of black gram gradually declined as there was no need for traders to sell under the time limit.

Nevertheless, as India has a monthly consumption of 200,000 tonnes of black gram, the requirement for black gram has been growing. This being so, the price drop is likely to happen for a while, and the bean traders shared their opinions.

The CBM's policy change notified on 3 April 2022 had a

considerable impact on the exporters. As a result of this, the trade is sluggish. The trade of various beans and pulses almost came to a halt, despite the price drop.

Prices will rise on the back of India's demand and the yield of Myanmar's black gram. However, prices will fall owing to the policy changes and export slowdown. Those factors influence market price, and price fluctuation is happening.

Nevertheless, there are no changes in cost and freight (CFR) and Free on board (FOB) prices despite the policy change. The exporters have to negotiate the prices with the suppliers. The observers analyzed the export prices are likely to remain bearish and it will deal a huge blow to the bean and pulses market.

Myanmar produces approximately 400,000 tonnes of black gram and about 50,000 tonnes of pigeon peas yearly. Myanmar is the top producer of the black gram, which is primarily demanded by India, while pigeon peas, green grams and chickpeas are cultivated in Australia and African countries besides Myanmar. —NN/GNLM

Koeman to take over as Netherlands coach after World Cup

FORMER Barcelona coach Ronald Koeman will take over as Netherlands boss from Louis van Gaal after this year's World Cup, the Dutch football federation said on Wednesday.

Van Gaal announced at the weekend that he had been receiving treatment for prostate cancer for the last two years but that he still hoped to lead the team at the finals that kick off in Qatar in November.

It will be 59-year-old Koeman's second time in charge of the Dutch national team after taking the reins from 2018 to 2020, when he left the post to become coach of Barcelona.

He was dismissed by the Spanish giants in October last year after 14 difficult months in charge which included the departure of Lionel Messi to Paris Saint-Germain as the club plunged into financial difficulties. "I am looking forward to working together again. When I left the national team a year and a half ago, it was certainly not because I wasn't happy," Koeman said.

Marianne van Leeuwen, the director of professional football at the Dutch federation, said: "We're very happy that Ronald is coming back next year." — AFP ■
