Five-Point Road Map of the State Administration Council

- 1. The Union Election Commission will be reconstituted and its mandated tasks, including the scrutiny of voter lists, shall be implemented in accordance with the law.
- 2. Effective measures will be taken with added momentum to prevent and manage the COVID-19 pandemic.
- 3. Actions will be taken to ensure the speedy recovery of businesses from the impact of COVID-19.
- 4. Emphasis will be placed on achieving enduring peace for the entire nation in line with the agreements set out in the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement.
- 5. Upon accomplishing the provisions of the state of emergency, free and fair multiparty democratic elections will be held in line with the 2008 Constitution, and further work will be undertaken to hand over State duties to the winning party in accordance with democratic standards.

Republic of the Union of Myanmar Ministry of Health Order No 83/2022

14th Waxing of Tagu 1383 ME 14 April 2022

THE Ministry of Health has issued this order by exercising its authority under Sub-section (b) of Section 21 of the Prevention and Control of Communicable Diseases

- 1. The Ministry of Health issued an order 56/2022 on 15-3-2022 to allow the gathering of up to 400 people starting 16-3-2022, exclusive of the exceptional cases to prevent the spread of the COVID-19 disease.
- Currently, as the COVID-19 positivity rate, infection rate and mortality rate have dropped significantly, the ban on mass gatherings will be revoked starting at 00:00 hour on 17-4-2022 (Myanmar New Year Day).
- 3. The people need to continuously follow the orders and directives issued by the Ministry of Health. Failure to comply with the orders and directives will result in legal action under the existing laws.



HE Myanmar society dubs the persons with disabilities as the disabled persons with capability as part of showing their white mindsets regarding the human rights and avoiding discrimination against the vulnerable ones.

Currently, Myanmar emphasizes the improvement of the role of persons with disabilities in line with this year's theme: "Leadership and participation of persons with disabilities toward an inclusive, accessible and sustainable post-COVID-19 world."

tional strategic plan for the rights of persons with disabilities (2022-2027) drawn in accord with the Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan (MSDP) and the ASE-AN Strategic Action Plan 2025 signed by Myanmar. Implementing these plans will have to create opportunities for persons with disabilities

Despite unavoidably accepting the life of vulnerability, persons with disabilities do not give up on the impacts of life and pour out their strenuous efforts for survival in order to stand tall among others in society. As such, not only the government but those from the environs of persons with disabilities need to give a hand to them and look after them in all aspects not to face discrimination. To do so, it is important to accurately compile the list of persons with disabilities residing across the nation for providing necessary assistance

At present, the government is classifying persons with disabilities and regis-

tering them. The pilot project for these measures will cover Pobbathiri Township of Nay Pyi Taw Council Area, Hlinethaya Township in Yangon Region, Nyaunglebin Township in Bago Region and Hpa-an Township in Kayin State. In so doing, emphasis will be placed on the registration of the persons with disabilities for strictly compiling the population with disabilities, as the 2014 census showed there were 2.3 million of the population with disabilities in Myanmar, accounting for 4.6 per cent.

As persons with disabilities become vulnerable due to inborn impacts or accidental events, it is necessary to uplift their morale, not be disappointed in their lives, and enhance their courage to stand tall in society to do everything. For example, the barrier-free zones have been established at the Nay Pyi Taw Myoma market and the water fountain park in Nay Pyi Taw. Indeed, a helping hand from society will be an encouragement for their physical and mental life.

SDGs have made the world smaller - Entering into an era getting pressure from other countries

INCE the beginning of the 21st century, the world has been moving towards one goal: "Sustainable Development Goals, abbreviated as SDGs", which was adopted at the 2015 United Nations General Assembly. All UN member states, including Myanmar, have agreed upon the SDGs as new goals to succeed in the Millennium Development Goals set out from 2001 to September 2015.

The purpose of the SDGs is to develop while satisfying the current generation's needs without eating up the assets needed by future generations. It means that we should do business so that the whole society will develop now and, in the future, aim at the realization of a society where no one is left behind, and you do not think only about yourselves. One hundred sixty-nine targets linked to the 17 Sustainable Development Goals, which are aimed to be achieved in the 15 years from 2016 to 2030, are shown as follows:

For example, the Goal 1, "NO POVERTY", does not mean that the rich should bless the poor with food and money, but the establishment of a system to mon-• Goal 13. CLIMATE AC- itor the wages of the people, to establish honest statistics and education to read them, to carry out equal access to resources and new technologies, educational opportunities, health services to maintain health, housing and financial services for the extremely poor living on less than \$ 1.25 a day. You should call for political efforts, such as building a policy framework that considers rights and gender and the efforts of the private sector.

The world is facing critically serious issues such as the recent rise in energy prices and fluctuations in exchange rates in a couple of months. If there is an education system to understand the situation when the causes occurred

Pfizer eyes Covid vaccine for all variants before 2023

A COVID-19 vaccine effective against multiple variants is possible before the end of 2022, the head of US pharmaceutical giant Pfizer said Wednesday.

Chairman Albert Bourla said the firm was also working on producing a vaccine that could provide good protection for a whole year, meaning people would come

back annually for boosters, as with influenza shots.

"I hope, clearly by autumn... that we could have a vaccine" that worked against not only the dominant Omicron but all known variants, he said.

"It is a possibility that we have it by then. It is not a certainty," he told a media briefing

organized by the International Federation of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers and Associations (IFPMA) big pharma lobby group.

The Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine is one of the most effective against Covid-19.

Though, like other jabs, it has seen waning effectiveness against the now-dominant Omi-

cron variant of the virus, it still offers strong protection against serious disease, hospitalisation and death.

IFPMA director general Thomas Cueni said the world had to learn to live with the virus that causes Covid-19 disease, saying: "We are beyond the time when you can eradicate SARS-CoV-2."

Bourla said there was a risk of vaccine fatigue, predicting that few people who have so far declined the chance to be vaccinated would change their minds, and suggesting that fewer people would come back for fourth doses than came forward for a third

"What the world really needs

is a vaccine that will last a year. I think this is what will become the optimal public health solution," he said. "It's way more easy to be administered and have the population be compliant with that.

"It is very challenging, technically, to do it with this virus but we are working on it."

Pedigree, genetic improvement approach to enhance production

MYANMAR'S economy depends on agriculture and livestock. In order to boost exports of fish and seafood quality and preserve the fishery resource for sustainable utilization, a research based on pedigree and genetic improvement approach is promising to enhance Myanmar's fishery sector, according to Myanmar Fisheries Federation.

Some regional countries showed a remarkable rise in income from the fishery exports. Myanmar has export prospects due to the abundant fishery resource. Genetic management to improve the production of native fish and shrimp and commercially valued fishery products are required. The success of the livestock sector will help increase the market shares of the fishery products among ASEAN countries. Viet Nam's freshwater fish and shrimp farming businesses can produce about 120,000 fish per acre. Myanmar has a capacity to farm 80,000 fish (rohu, carp and seabass) per acre. An advanced fishing culture is required for the growth rate and environmental assessment.

Additionally, the Dubai market prefers eel and Lepidocephalichthys berdmorei (Burmese loach). However, research activities and genetic management for those species whose qualities are decreasing and those endangered fish species are to promote the sustainable economic growth of the country

and the economic benefits for the breeders. Myanmar's fishery products that EU countries eye is also needed to increase the quality for the future fishery prospects.

"Those stakeholders in the supply chain must identify the market opportunities and trends to effectuate the fishery sector development. Earlier, Saudi Arabia and Dubai buyers were not interested in the striped snakehead and Burmese loach. Now, they are into those species. The market of rohu, carp, sea bass and other freshwater and saltwater species have limited market access only.

Therefore, genetic research

and analysis in line with advanced technology are required.

The breeders must choose the commercially valued species by following the trend. Freshwater shrimps were once famous. Now, those species are extinct. Genetic improvement is required as artificial breeding harms the quality after three to four years. International countries are maintaining genetic improvement. Fish and shrimp research centre is underway in Myanmar to disseminate the information to the breeders and implement the pedigree and genetic modification for the fishery sector development», said Dr Toe Nanda Tin, senior vice-president of the MFF.

Gold transactions must be done depending on CBM reference exchange rate: YGEA

GOLD transactions will be undertaken depending on the Central Bank of Myanmar's reference exchange rate, according to Yangon Region Gold Entrepreneurs Association (YGEA).

According to the provisions stipulated in Sections 11, 12 and 13 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law, the foreign exchange earned by locals in Myanmar must be deposited in accounts at the authorized dealers and exchanged for the local currency at the Central Bank of Myanmar's reference rate of K1,850 within one working day,

according to the notification released on 3 April.

Thus YGEA called for an urgent meeting on 8 April. The panel determined to carry out gold transactions depending on the CBM's reference exchange rate.

The US dollar stands at K2,000 in the unofficial black market, while the CBM reference rate is K1,850. Consequently, the gold price is likely to drop a bit.

The YGEA's office is closed during the Thingyan holidays between 9 and 17 April. Therefore,

the data on the daily gold prices cannot be released.

The pure gold fetched K2.041 million per tical (0.578 ounce, or 0.016 kilogramme) on 7 April before the urgent meeting.

The domestic gold price is highly correlated with the global gold price, YGEA stated.

During the end of September 2021, a dollar value hit an all-time high of over K3,000 in the gold exchanges and consequently, the pure gold reached a record high of K2.22 million per tical in history. — NN/GNLM

Seeking import licence after goods arriving at the port not allowed from 20 April

ACCORDING to the Trade Department under the Ministry of Commerce, seeking an import licence prior to the goods arriving at the port is required starting from 20 April 2022.

In a bid to have a smooth trade flow, the MoC earlier allowed the importers to make shipments before customs regulations. Import licence can be held even on the day when the goods arrive at the port. If the importers have not received any permit, customs regulation was previously valid prior to arrival processing.

However, some importers took advantage of that process and applied for an import licence only after the goods arrived. According to the Import/Export regulation 2015 notification (93/2015) of the Ministry of Commerce dated 22 October 2015, some goods that require an import licence for export must not have arrived before the import permit.

Additionally, as per the

notification of the Ministry of Planning and Finance, customs regulation must be in line with the notification (50/2020) of the Ministry of Commerce dated 8 July 2020, stating that the goods that require import licence must not be shipped prior to the permit, except the goods which require customs warehousing procedures.

Those companies that failed to seek import licence prior to those goods arriving at the port, except those related to the customs warehousing procedure, will face legal actions in compliance with the export/import laws.

Some companies and entrepreneurs still violate the rules to avoid unnecessary loss regardless of the notification. The importers cannot seek import licence only after the arrivals of the goods starting from 20 April 2022. MoC notified the importers again on 5 April 2022 of the legal actions for violations under the export/import law.

South Korea raises interest rate to tame inflation

South Korea's central bank on Thursday raised its key interest rate to the highest level since August 2019 to tame rising inflation, especially soaring energy costs linked to the Ukraine crisis.

The Bank of Korea (BOK) raised the borrowing cost to 1.5 per cent — its third hike in less than a year — after keeping it at a record low for two years during the coronavirus pandemic.

The latest decision comes as Asia's fourth-largest economy recovers from a Covid-induced slowdown with a rebound in demand, while struggling with rising fuel and raw material prices.

"Inflation has accelerated while the recovery of the global economy has somewhat moderated, affected by the Ukraine crisis," the central bank said in a press release — AFP South Korea's consumer prices jumped 4.1 percent in March from a year earlier, the fastest pace in more than a decade. Thursday's policy meeting had been closely watched as it came after the US Federal Reserve raised its interest rate for the first time since 2018 to tame prices.—AFP

Tax data reveals Olympics ignited Chinese winter sports fever

The Beijing 2022 Winter Olympics and Paralympics have brought a wave of winter sports fever in China, leading to a rapid increase in the sales revenue of related sectors, data from the country's tax authorities showed.

In March, the sales revenue of the sports industry in Chongli District in the city of Zhangjiakou, Hebei Province and Beijing's Yanqing District, both housing venues for the 2022 Winter Olympics, surged 65 per cent and 62.6 per cent year on year, respectively, according to the tax data released by the State Taxation Administration.

In the first quarter, the cumulative sales revenue of the sports industry in the two areas logged rapid yearly growth of 35.2 per cent and 68.9 per cent, the data showed.—Xinhua ■

Singapore's GDP grow by 3.4 pct on year in Q1

SINGAPORE'S Ministry of Trade and Industry announced on Thursday morning that based on advance estimates, the country's gross domestic product (GDP) grew by 3.4 per cent year on year in the first quarter of 2022, moderating from the 6.1 per cent growth in the previous quarter.

On a seasonally-adjusted basis, the Singapore economy grew by 0.4 per cent quarter on quarter, compared to the 2.3 per cent growth in the previous quarter.

In a breakdown, Singapore's manufacturing sector expanded by six per cent year on year in the first quarter, moderating from the 15.5 per cent growth in the previous quarter. The con-

tinued growth was supported by output expansions in all clusters, except for the chemicals cluster.

The construction sector grew by 1.8 per cent year on year in the first quarter, following the 2.9 per cent growth in the previ-


ous quarter. In absolute terms, the value-added of the sector remained 25.3 per cent below its pre-COVID-19 level in the first quarter of 2019, as activity at construction worksites continued to be weighed down by labour shortages.

Meanwhile, the services-producing industries expanded by 3.9 per cent year on year, compared to the 4.4 per cent expansion in the previous quarter.

The advanced GDP estimates released on Thursday were computed largely from data in the first two months of the quarter, according to the ministry. These figures are intended as an early indication of the GDP growth in the quarter, and are subject to revision when more comprehensive data become available.

The ministry said it will release the preliminary GDP estimates for the third quarter this May. —Xinhua ■

New Zealand's lobster export benefits from upgraded FTA with China despite COVID-19

NEW Zealand's lobster exporters are optimistic about post-COVID exports to China, boosted by an upgraded free trade agreement (FTA) that entered into force last week. "We are definitely optimistic about post-COVID exports, as Chinese consumers return to restaurants and enjoy celebrating together again," Fiordland Lobster Company General Manager Andrew Harvey told Xinhua on Tuesday. The company is New Zealand's largest exporter of live rock lobsters. Harvey noted that China's National Day Golden Week in October is always one of the most important events on

the calendar for lobster exports.

"We're optimistic that it will be again this year, if COVID-19 allows," Harvey said. His company started lobster export to China in the 1990s. A recent good news for New Zealand's export sector is the protocol on upgrading the China-New Zealand FTA taking effect last Thursday. The upgraded FTA makes exporting to China easier and reduces compliance costs for New Zealand exporters by addressing a range of non-tariff issues, such as a six-hour limit on customs clearance of perishable goods and proper storage while pending release.—Xinhua

India's Infosys to exit Russia business

INDIAN software giant Infosys said Wednesday it was "transitioning" out of the Russian market following the Ukraine war and conflict of interest accusations levelled at Rishi Sunak, the British finance minister.

Sunak's wife Akshata Murty holds a nearly \$1 billion stake in the IT firm, which was founded by her father N.R. Narayana Murthy and established itself as a global outsourcing behemoth.

Critics have accused Sunak

of financially benefiting from Infosys operations in Russia through his wife's stake, even in the wake of stiff British sanctions against Moscow in response to the invasion of Ukraine.

"Given what is going on in the region, we have started to transition all of our work from our centres in Russia to our centres outside Russia," chief executive and managing director Salil Parekh told a media briefing.

"We have no work with any

Russian client today and we have no plans for any work with any Russian client going ahead," he

Parekh said the company was "very concerned" about the situation in Ukraine and had committed \$1 million in humanitarian aid.

But he declined to confirm if the company's board has discussed recent criticism surrounding Murty's stake in the company.—AFP■

Chinese man gets Japan's 1st skilled worker visa with no time limit

A 35-year-old Chinese man has become the first person to be granted a resident status that effectively allows foreign blue-collar workers to stay in Japan indefinitely, the infrastructure ministry and a supporting organization said Thursday.

Weng Fei, an employee of a construction company in Gifu Prefecture, central Japan, obtained Wednesday the Specified Skilled Worker No. 2 status under a policy introduced by Japan in April 2019 to attract foreign workers and address the country's severe labour shortage.

The system allows foreigners with certain Japanese language and vocational skills to apply for a resident status called Specified Skilled Worker No. 1, which grants working rights in 14 sectors, such as construction, farming and nursing, for up to five years.

Proficient labourers in two sectors — construction and shipbuilding — can further extend their stay by earning the

Specified Skilled Worker No. 2 status. It allows holders to bring in family members and has no limit on the number of times they can renew their visa.

Weng, who first came to Japan in 2010 as a technical trainee to work at his current construction company, was granted the Specified Skilled Worker No. 1 status in 2020.

He later obtained grade 1 in the technical skills test, a national system to certify vocational abilities, meaning he has high-level skills in his field of work needed for positions other than managers.—Kyodo ■

Judge slashes Tesla's damages to exemployee in racism case

A San Francisco judge on Wednesday slashed the \$137 million in damages Tesla was told to pay a former employee in a racial discrimination case down to \$15 million but upheld the verdict.

In his ruling, US District Court Judge William Orrick said "the weight of the evidence amply supports the jury's liability findings" but the damages ordered were "excessive," citing constitutional limitations on punitive damages set by the Supreme Court.

Tesla was ordered in October to pay Black former employee Owen Diaz \$137 million in damages for turning a blind eye to racism the man encountered at the firm's Silicon Valley auto plant.

Rejecting Tesla's request for a retrial, Orrick said "Tesla's indifference to Diaz's complaints is striking." - AFP■

E-cig giant Juul to pay \$22.5m in underage lawsuit

E-cigarette firm Juul has agreed to pay \$22.5 million in a US lawsuit that alleged the company deliberately targeted teenagers and lied about how addictive its products are, Washington state's attorneygeneral said Wednesday.

The company, whose wide range of exotic flavoured vapes — including mango and creme brulee — made it a byword for e-cigarettes in the United States, did not admit any wrongdoing but agreed to rein in its advertising.

In the latest such multi-million-dollar suit it has settled with a US state, Juul Labs agreed to pull commercials that appeal to young people, including on social media. It will also work to ensure stores in the state are not selling its products to anyone underage. — AFP■

The course of the war and the impact on Volkswagen "cannot be predicted with sufficient certainty" but risked having a "negative impact" on the Wolfsburg-based group.

SOUTH Korean President-elect Yoon Suk-yeol nominated eight more ministers and his chief secretary on Wednesday ahead of his inauguration as president on 10 May. During a press conference, Yoon tapped Park Jin and Kwon Young-se, four-term lawmakers of the main conservative People Power Party, as foreign and unification ministers respectively.

Kim Dae-ki, former presidential chief of staff for policy, was named as Yoon's chief secretary, while Han Dong-hoon, senior prosecutor and one of close confidants to Yoon, was nominated as justice minister. Yoon announced the nomination of Kim In-chul, former president

of Hankuk University of Foreign Studies as minister of education who doubles as deputy prime minister for social affairs.

Lee Sang-min, former vice chief of the Anti-Corruption and Civil Rights Commission, was nominated as interior and safety minister, while Han Wha-jin, honorary researcher of the Korea Environment Institute, was selected for minister of environment.

Cho Seung-hwan, former chief of the Korea Institute of Marine Science and Technology Promotion, was tapped as minister of oceans and fisheries, and Rep. Lee Young of the People Power Party was picked as minister of SMEs and startups.—Xinhua

US-led task force to patrol Red Sea off wartorn Yemen

The United States is to lead a new task force patrolling the Red Sea, senior officials said on Wednesday, less than two weeks after the start of a truce in war-torn Yemen.

The Combined Task Force, involving 34 countries, will cover the Red Sea — a major shipping lane that has witnessed a series of Huthi rebel attacks — and the Gulf of Aden. "The area is so vast we can't do it alone," Vice-Admiral Brad Cooper, the commander of the US Navy's Central Command, the Bahrain-based Fifth Fleet and the task force, told reporters. Cooper declined to discuss Yemen when asked about the reasons for the new task force, which follows similar ventures in and around the Gulf and anti-piracy operations.—AFP

Australia asks Solomon Islands not to sign security pact with China

AUSTRALIA on Wednesday asked the Solomon Islands not to sign a proposed security agreement between the Pacific Island nation and China, which Canberra fears could lead to the establishment of a Chinese military presence on the island.

The proposed deal was agreed upon by the two countries on 31 March and established a framework that could allow Beijing to deploy forces to "protect the safety of Chinese personnel and major projects in Solomon Islands," according to a draft official document leaked on social media.—Kyodo

Hiroshima resets "peace clock" after US subcritical nuclear tests

A "peace clock" monument in Hiroshima that counts the number of days since the last nuclear test, has been reset after the city learned the United States conducted two subcritical nuclear tests last year.

The digital number at the clock installed at the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum was changed from 499 to 209 on Wednesday following revelations that two experiments had been conducted on 22 June and

16 Sept last year in Nevada.

According to the US National Nuclear Security Administration, they marked the first such tests under the administration of President Joe Biden and formed part of three successive tests.

The first was conducted under the previous administration of Donald Trump in November 2020, when the clock was last

Takuo Takigawa, the director of the museum, said it was "very disappointing" to learn of the US tests "amid a global situation where the risk of nuclear weapons use is a concern."

The 3.1-metre-tall clock was donated to the museum by a pacifist organization in 2001, on the 56th anniversary of the Aug. 6, 1945, US atomic bombing of the western Japanese city, in the hope of reducing the number of nuclear tests.—Kyodo ■

Meta tests sale of virtual goods in metaverse

META, the parent company of Facebook and Instagram, will give content creators the opportunity to sell virtual items to users in Horizon Worlds, its main platform in the metaverse, the company said Monday.

"For example, someone could make and sell attachable accessories for a fashion world or offer paid access to a new part of a world," the Californian tech

group said in a press release.

The metaverse, touted by Meta and other companies as the future of the internet, consists of a set of parallel "universes" accessed primarily through augmented and virtual reality platforms.

It already exists in a basic way in the form of video games such as Minecraft, Fortnite and Roblox and social platforms such as Horizon Worlds, and VRChat, where people come together not only to play, but also to interact and participate in events. Meta, whose income is overwhelmingly dependent on large-scale targeted advertising, has made it its mission to make a major contribution to the emergence of the metaverse, and is staking out its place in the next battle for the public's attention. —AFP

Russian warship 'seriously damaged' in ammunition explosion: state media

THE Russian navy's Black Sea flagship has been "seriously damaged" by an ammunition explosion, Russian state media said Thursday.

"As a result of a fire, ammunition detonated on the Moskva missile cruiser. The ship was seriously damaged," the Russian defence ministry was quoted as saying, adding that the cause of

the fire was being determined and that the crew had been evacuated

Earlier, the governor of Odessa said that Ukrainian forces had hit the Moskva with missile strikes. "Neptune missiles guarding the Black Sea caused very serious damage to the Russian ship. Glory to Ukraine!" governor Maksym Marchenko wrote on

Telegram

A spokesman for the Odessa military administration, Sergey Bratchuk, said on Telegram that "according to available data, the cause of the 'serious damage' was 'Neptune' domestic cruise missiles". Ukrainian presidential advisor Oleksiy Arestovych said that "a surprise happened" with the Moskva.—AFP

Russia accuses US-funded labs of developing bio-weapons

US-FUNDED biological laboratories in Ukraine were engaged in developing components of biological weapons, Deputy Chairman of the Russian Security Council Dmitry Medvedev said Tuesday.

"It is impossible not to mention the activities conducted by the United States and its allies near the Russian borders," Medvedev said at a government meeting. Such activities were not aimed at searching for effective means of protection against dangerous diseases or cooperating with the international community, he stressed.—Xinhua

More than 1,000 Ukraine marines have surrendered in Mariupol

RUSSIA'S Defence Ministry said Wednesday that 1,026 Ukrainian servicemen of Ukraine's 36th Marine Brigade had surrendered in the Ukrainian city of Mariupol, following an offensive carried out by Russia's armed forces and the militia units of Donetsk. A total of 162 officers and 47 servicewomen were among those who surrendered, and 151 wounded Ukrainian soldiers received immediate medical treatment, Russian Defense Ministry Spokesman Igor Konashenkov said during his daily briefing.—Xinhua ■

The critical fight for Mariupol

UKRAINIAN Presidential Advisor Oleksiy Arestovych said Wednesday that the 36th Marine Brigade had broken fighting lines and joined the Azov Battalion in the besieged city of Mariupol. "In general, the city's defense system has grown and strengthened," Arestovych wrote on Facebook.

Automobile connection between Kiev and the city of Chernihiv

THE Ukrainian authorities are working to restore the automobile connection between Kiev and the city of Chernihiv in northern Ukraine, Deputy Head of Ukraine's Presidential Office Kyrylo Tymoshenko said Wednesday.

Work is underway to build temporary passages for automobile transport near the two key bridges destroyed in the Chernihiv region, Tymoshenko wrote on Telegram.

Efforts to clean up the Kyiv-Chernihiv highway from landmines and other explosives are also underway, he said.

Russia to seek alternative to European energy market

RUSSIAN President Vladimir Putin said Wednesday that Russia will aim to increase the consumption of Russian oil, gas and coal on the domestic market, and increase the supply of energy resources to other parts of the world. "The refusal of a number of Western countries to cooperate normally" and their partial ban on Russian energy resources have already affected millions of Europeans, further provoking an energy crisis and unprecedented inflation, Putin said during a meeting on the development of the Russian Arctic zone.

Russia's economy is beginning to crack

RUSSIA'S gross domestic product contraction at the end of 2022 would surpass 10 percent and inflation could reach 20 per cent, said Aleksei Kudrin, head of the country's Accounts Chamber, Russia's TASS news agency reported Wednesday.

Russia threatens Kyiv

THE Russian military threatens to strike Ukraine's command centres in Kyiv as "we are seeing Ukrainian troops' attempts to carry out sabotage and strike Russian territory," Moscow's defence ministry says.

"If such cases continue, the Russian armed forces will strike decision-making centres, including in Kyiv," the ministry states.

Le Pen for NATO-Moscow rapprochement

FRENCH far-right leader Marine Le Pen says she will back closer ties between NATO and Russia and pull Paris out of the alliance's military command if elected president in an 24 April runoff with Emmanuel Macron.

Following accusations she is too close to Vladimir Putin, Le Pen said a "strategic rapprochement" is needed and questions need to be asked about the role of the alliance after the end of the Warsaw Pact.

Ceasefire seems impossible: UN

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres says a "global ceasefire doesn't seem possible", indicating the UN is still waiting for answers from Russia to concrete proposals for evacuating civilians and delivering aid. "That was our appeal for humanitarian reasons, but it doesn't seem possible," said Guterres.

Prosecutors call for Maradona medical staff to face trial

PROSECUTORS investigating the 2020 death of Argentine soccer legend Diego Maradona have asked that the medical staff who treated him be tried for negligent

In their request Wednesday, the prosecutors said "omissions" and mismanagement by eight medical professionals in charge of Maradona placed him in a "situation of helplessness" and abandoned him "to his fate" during his home hospitalization, according to the court filing cited by the official Telam news agency.

Maradona died at age 50 in 2020 while recovering from brain surgery for a blood clot, and after decades of battles with cocaine and alcohol addictions.

Neurosurgeon and family doctor Leopoldo Luque and psychiatrist Agustina Cosachov are under investigation over his death as the main people responsible for the health of the former football star.

Six others, including psychologist Carlos Diaz and medical coordinator Nancy Forlini, are also accused. —AFP ■
