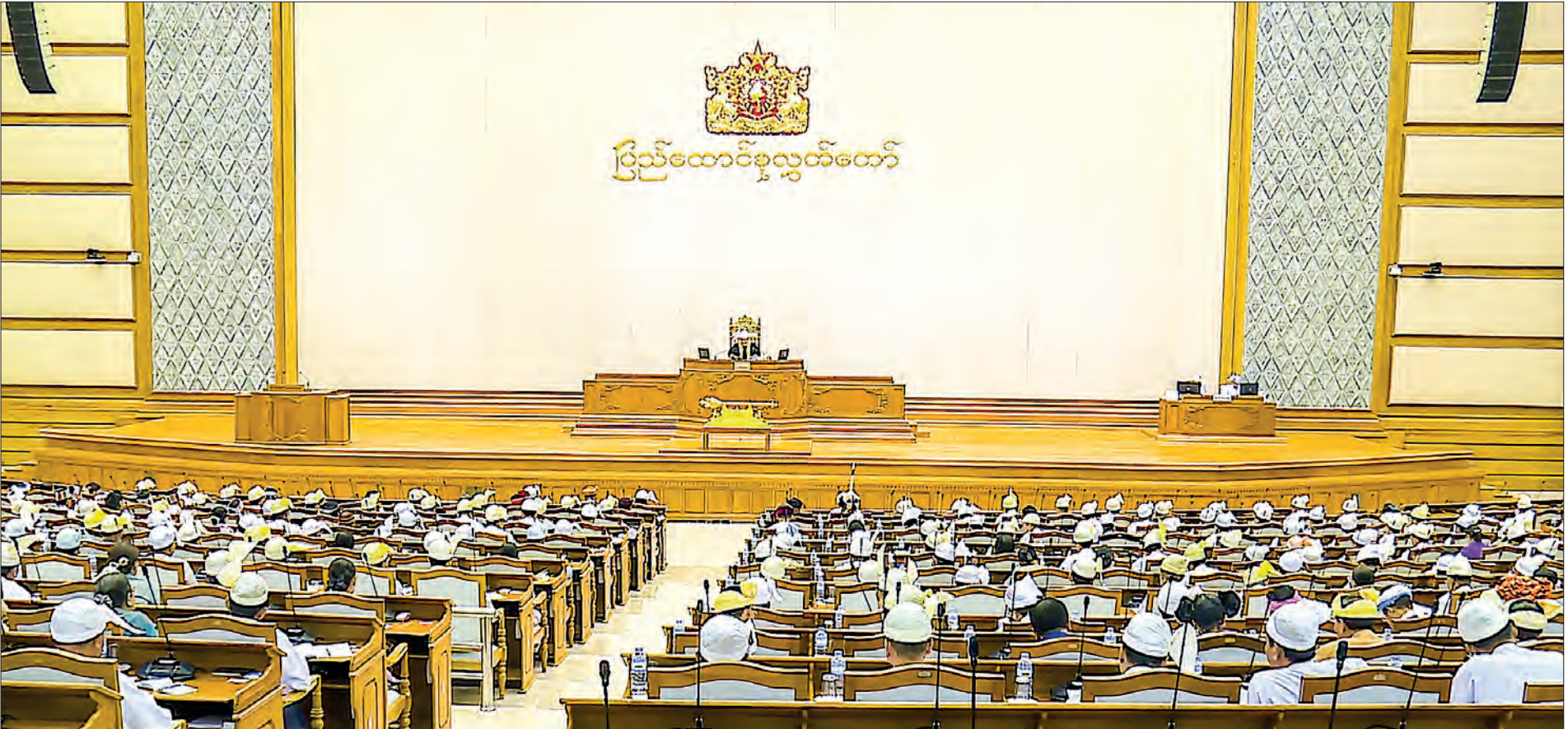


Four Objectives of the National Defence and Security Council

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Deputy Speaker leads Joint Bill Committee and Joint Public Accounts Committee



The first regular session of the Third Pyidaungsu Hluttaw enters its fifth day in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

The Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approved appointment and duty assignment to U Aung Zaw Thein as Chair of the Constitutional Tribunal of the Union, 30 Union Ministers, Dr Thida Oo as Union Attorney-General, Daw Naing Thet Oo as Union Auditor-General, Dr Khin Naing Oo as CBM Governor, and U Soe Thein as Anti-Corruption Commission Chair.

The first regular session of the Third Pyidaungsu Hluttaw continued for the fifth-day meeting at its hall in the Hluttaw Complex in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday. Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U Aung Lin Dwe announced U Nyan Tun, U Myo Tint, U Kyaw Hsan, U Tu Maw, Daw Su Su Win, Daw Ohnma Aye, U Tint Wai and Dr Marlar Maw as members, and U Aung Zaw Thein as Chairman of the Constitutional Tribunal of the Union, as there was no objection to the nomination

of the tribunal. Moreover, the Speaker declared 30 Union ministers nominated by the President-elect without any objections, and the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approved them. Those Union Ministers are U Khin Maung Yi, U Aung Kyaw Hoe, U Tin Aung San, U Mya Tun Oo, General Tun Aung, Lt-Gen Nyunt Win Swe, U Tin Maung Swe, Dr Kan Zaw, Lt-Gen Phone Myat, U Than Maung, Dr Thida Oo, Dr Chaw Chaw Sein, Dr Myo Thein Kyaw, Dr Thet Khaing Win, Dr Thet Thet Zin, U Htein

Lin, U Tin Oo Lwin, U Min Naung, U Myo Zaw Thein, U Hsan Oo, U Ko Ko Lwin, Dr Charlie Than, U Myint Kyaing, U Khin Maung Soe, U Tun Ohn, U Ye Myint Tun, Dr Maung Thin, U Myo Thant, Dr Soe Win and U Maung Myint. The Speaker stated that Dr Thida Oo was nominated as the Union Attorney-General and Daw Naing Thet Oo as the Union Auditor-General by the President-elect. As there was no objection to their appointment, the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approved Dr Thida Oo as Union

Attorney-General and Daw Naing Thet Oo as Union Auditor-General. The Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker said that the President-elect has submitted the list of eight Supreme Court Judges to the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw. As there was no objection, the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approved appintment of U Thaug Naing, U Thein Ko Ko, Daw Thin Thin Nwet, Daw Pyone Pyone Aye, Dr Ko Ko Naing, U Win Myint, Daw Soe Khet Khet and Daw Thin Thin Cho as Supreme Court Judges.

AT yesterday’s meeting of Kachin State Hluttaw, Daw Aye Aye Maw as Chief Justice of the State High Court, nominated by the President-elect, was approved without objections. The Hluttaw also approved seven ministries and state ministers, the Kachin State Advocate-General, the Auditor-General and State High Court Judges nominated by the State Chief Minister-elect and the formation of the standing committees of the State Hluttaw.

The Chin State Hluttaw Speaker sought approval for the appointment of state ministers at seven ministries with the discussions of four State Hluttaw rep-

resentatives.

Yesterday’s Sagaing Region Hluttaw approved regional ministers at seven ministries in addition to the Shan Ethnic Affairs Minister and the Chin Ethnic Affairs Minister sent by the President’s Office. The Hluttaw agreed on the appointment of U Hla Tun from the Nanyun Constituency 2 as Chair of the Naga Self-Administered Zone Leading Body and the formation of State Hluttaw standing committees.

The Taninthayi Region Hluttaw continued its session with the formation of regional Hluttaw standing committees, the nomination of chair and members, re-

sponsibilities, authority, rights and term.

The Mon State Hluttaw recorded the Mon State Chief Minister and individuals to be appointed as the state-level organizations and the formation of the standing committee.

The Deputy Speaker of the Rakhine State Hluttaw submitted the nomination of individuals for the standing committee to the Hluttaw. The Speaker of the Hluttaw urged the Hluttaw representatives wishing to object to the nominations of the standing committees to register their names no later than 4 pm on 9 April.

The Yangon Region Hluttaw ap-

proved the formation of 10 standing committees.

The Shan State Chief Minister-elect submitted the nomination of ethnic affairs ministers to the Shan State Hluttaw. Moreover, approvals were sought from the Shan State Hluttaw to form the Pa-O and Danu Self-Administered Zone Leading Bodies.

The Ayeyawady Region Hluttaw Speaker stated the formation of six standing committees and their members, responsibilities, authority, rights and terms with the approval of the Region Hluttaw.

Myanmar and India extend MoU on black gram, pigeon peas trading

A ceremony for the Exchange of Letters extension of Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) on cooperation in the trade of black gram and pigeon peas between Myanmar and India was held yesterday evening at the Parkroyal Hotel in Nay Pyi Taw.

Deputy Minister for Commerce U Min Min and Indian Minister of State for External Affairs Mr Kirit Vardhan Singh made remarks at the event.

Permanent Secretary U Aung Thwin Oo and Indian

Ambassador to Myanmar Mr Abhay Thakur exchanged the Exchange of Letters on the extension of black gram and pigeon peas trading.

The MoU signed between the Ministry of Commerce of Myanmar and the Ministry of Consumer Affairs, Food and Public Distribution of India was extended to further five years until the 2030-2031 financial year.

Under this agreement, Myanmar will be allowed to export annually up to 250,000 tonnes of black gram and 100,000 tonnes of pigeon peas

to India. This extension is expected to enhance confidence among Myanmar’s farmers, traders, and exporters in their production and export activities. Moreover, it can also strengthen bilateral relationships and mutual understanding between the two countries, and also create good outcomes and new pathways for cooperation in development measures.

After the ceremony, the dinner was served for the delegation led by the Indian Minister of State for External Affairs. — MNA/KTZH

Public Notice

1. The period from the 13th waning of Tagu to the 1st waxing of Kason, 1387 ME, marks the Maha Thingyan festival, the transition from the old to the new year.
2. During this period, the Myanmar people perform good deeds such as paying respect to elders, holding novitiation and ordination ceremonies, and releasing animals.
3. Moreover, there is also a tradition that one sprays another with scented water using Thabyay as a symbol of washing one’s sins away from the previous year.
4. However, excessive merrymaking, particularly among youths, can lead to undesirable consequences such as causing injury through rough water play, teasing others beyond tolerance, conflicts, and traffic accidents.
5. Therefore, the traditional Myanmar Maha Thingyan festival 1387 ME shall be celebrated in accordance with the following objectives;
 - (a) To preserve and uphold the traditional Myanmar Maha Thingyan festival in accordance with customs and traditions,
 - (b) To enable the public to participate in the water festival joyfully and peacefully,
 - (c) To help people refresh themselves from fatigue with Thingyan water so they can carry out State duties with renewed strength in the New Year,
 - (d) To continue safeguarding and valuing Myanmar traditions, cultural essence, and national characteristics,
6. Therefore, the people are urged to avoid the following: -
 - (a) Behaviours and actions that refrain from Myanmar customs and traditions or appear inappropriate for the Myanmar people
 - (b) The use of abusive, rude, or religiously inappropriate language
 - (c) Rough or harmful water play actions and harassment that may cause injury or danger to others
 - (d) Any form of speech, Thangyat (satirical slam poetry), singing, or activity directly or indirectly that harms the dignity or reputation of individuals or organizations
 - (e) Wearing costumes that contradict Myanmar cultural norms or offend public sensibilities
 - (f) Excessive imitation of behaviours, speech, clothing, food, or dances that can diminish the respect and appreciation among people of other countries for the value of Myanmar’s traditional Maha Thingyan, and excessive consumption of alcohol

MoE Deputy Minister inspects Maubin (South) oil and gas field as output rises

DEPUTY Minister for Energy U Kyaw Naing Win, accompanied by departmental officials, visited the Maubin (South) oil and natural gas field yesterday.

During the visit, the Deputy Minister and his team inspected wells No 16, 18 and 20 at the Maubin (South) field. The Managing Director of the Myanmar Oil and Gas Enterprise briefed them on the analysis of gas-bearing sand layers in the wells, current production conditions, and plans for further development.

In response to the presentations, the Deputy Minister emphasized the need to adopt modern technologies to enhance oil and natural gas production from domestic fields. He also

expressed appreciation to staff involved in increasing production, particularly for efforts at Plot No 18 in the Maubin (South) field in the Ayeyawady Region.

Since drilling began at Plot No 18 on 26 February, the well has been producing approximately 1.6 million cubic feet of natural gas and eight barrels of condensate per day. Similarly, drilling at Plot No 20, which commenced on 15 March, has yielded around 1.5 million cubic feet of natural gas and seven barrels of condensate per day, while Plot No 16, drilled on 3 April, is producing about 1.6 million cubic feet of natural gas and eight barrels of condensate daily.

He further noted that,

among Myanmar’s onshore oil and gas fields, the Maubin (South) field produces natural gas with a high content of C3 (propane) and C4 (butane). These components can be used in the initial stage of producing LPG and naphtha. Gas derived from these products can then be distributed to fertilizer

plants, industrial facilities and compressed natural gas outlets for vehicles, making it a highly valuable resource. The Deputy Minister later presented awards and gifts to the staff.

The recent increase in natural gas production is expected to significantly support the energy needs of lower Myanmar and

enable greater distribution of natural gas for vehicles in Yangon, thereby helping to ease the current fuel shortage. Seismic surveys are also being conducted to identify new onshore oil fields, and the Ministry of Energy will continue to oversee exploratory drilling activities.

FOREIGN currencies were traded in the market for the import of edible oil, fuel oil, pesticides, pharmaceutical products, raw materials, telecommunications equipment, industrial raw materials, car and motorcycle spare parts, construction materials, vegetable seeds, and consumer goods. From the CMP sector revenue, US\$1 million was allocated to the fuel sector, US\$1.36 million to the edible oil sector, and 2.40 million Thai baht was sold by the Central Bank of Myanmar to the food, agricultural products, and industrial raw materials sectors. — MNA/TH

Take care when using unsafe water during the Thingyan festival

MYANMAR is a country with rich cultural traditions and customs. Traditional festivals and activities of the ethnic groups are also held as seasonal festivals throughout the whole 12 months. Among these, the Thingyan festival is considered the most vibrant and happiest one, and it is attended by all ethnics. In fact, Thingyan festival is one of the monthly seasonal festivals as well as a traditional festival.

The traditional Myanmar Thingyan festival will fall in the near future. During this New Year festival, which takes place at the end of the old year, people follow the custom of gently sprinkling water on one another. This practice reflects the long-standing

cultural heritage of the Myanmar people. Within the Thingyan festivities, people of all ages, including children and youth, playing with water are reminded to be careful and considerate so that everyone can celebrate safely without causing harm or accidents using water.

During Thingyan water celebrations, it is important to use clean water; as unclean or dirty water can easily cause skin irritation and the spread of diseases. Water from pipelines that may be contaminated can also lead to infections or illnesses. Therefore, people are advised to use water carefully and avoid dirty or unsafe water. Participants should take care to prevent water from entering their eyes, ears, nose, or mouth while taking part in the festivities. In addition, during Thingyan water celebrations, people should avoid participating in water splashing during extreme heat or strong sunlight and should take breaks in the shade when necessary. Outside, only clean water that is

safe for use should be applied, avoiding water that may be contaminated or unsafe. Using water responsibly helps prevent dehydration and maintains good hygiene during the festival.

The Thingyan festival is a joyful and refreshing time for the people of Myanmar. Traditionally, the Myanmar people celebrate this festival with rich cultural customs, including the gentle sprinkling of scented water on one another as a sign of goodwill, symbolically washing away the dirt and misfortunes of the old year. However, some revellers intentionally splash each other with unclean or dirty water, which can be harmful to health.

A safe and healthy festival environment allows everyone to enjoy themselves peacefully and comfortably. Therefore, during Thingyan water celebrations, people are advised to be careful and attentive to avoid accidents or health risks that could arise from overheated conditions or improper water play, ensuring a joyful and safe experience for all.

A New Government and New Momentum in the New Year

IN A democratic system, elections are an indispensable process. Democracy embodies two essential dimensions: participation and competition. These two dimensions must be fully realized through free and fair elections, which constitute the very essence of democratic practice. Representatives, elected by the people in accordance with their free will, enter legislative bodies through the electoral process to represent the voice of the people. In doing so, parliaments serve as the fundamental pillars of law-making and as platforms through which the people's will is expressed.

The right to vote is a fundamental right of every citizen. This principle is enshrined in Section 38 (a) of the 2008 Constitution, every citizen shall have the right to elect and to be elected under the law. Furthermore, international

frameworks such as the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (Article 21) and the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights (Article 25) guarantee the right to participate in elections. The Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women affirms equal electoral rights for women, while the Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities ensures that persons with disabilities can exercise their voting rights without barriers.

Despite the state's efforts to ensure inclusive participation, certain anti-democratic elements attempted to derail the process through 'No Vote' campaigns and acts of terrorism. These included the destruction of polling stations and targeted attacks on civil servants and volunteers to incite fear. Nevertheless, democracy does not belong to any single individual or

party. Despite such challenges, a total of 57 political parties participated, and the elections were successfully conducted in a free and fair manner.

During the first phase of the elections, international observers from countries including Russia,

Belarus, China, Kazakhstan, Cambodia, Vietnam, and Nicaragua, as well as a Japan-Myanmar association, monitored the process. In the third phase, observers from Cambodia, Vietnam, Nicaragua, Indonesia, Nepal, Belarus, and India, along with the International

Conference of Asian Political Parties (ICAPP), also participated. These observation groups generally provided positive assessments, recognizing the elections as credible and well-conducted.

Following the successful completion of free and fair elections,

legislative bodies at various levels were formed. Speakers and Deputy Speakers of Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw were elected, and standing committees were established to carry out parliamentary functions. Following the emergence of the new Hluttaws, the presidential election process commenced on 31 March. The electoral college, divided into three groups, nominated their respective Vice-Presidents:

- ❖ Pyithu Hluttaw Representative Group: Senior General Min Aung Hlaing was elected as Vice-President after receiving 247 out of 260 votes.
- ❖ Amyotha Hluttaw Representative Group: Nan Ni Ni Aye was elected as Vice-President, securing 117 out of 155 votes.
- ❖ Defence Services Personnel Representatives Group: U Nyo Saw was unanimously confirmed as Vice-President. Subsequently, during the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw session held on 3 April, with 584 out of 586 rep-

resentatives in attendance, the presidential election was conducted. Among the candidates, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing received the highest number of votes (429 votes) and was duly elected as the President. U Nyo Saw and Nan Ni Ni Aye were elected as Vice-Presidents.

This marks a significant milestone in Myanmar's political history, particularly with the emergence of the country's first female Vice-President. The inclusion of women in national leadership reflects a progressive step towards gender equality and inclusive governance. Following the conduct of free and fair elections, representative elected from various political parties, ethnic representatives, and independent members within the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw collectively exercised their equal rights and responsibilities in accordance with democratic principles. Through a unanimous vote, they elected Senior General Min Aung Hlaing as the President of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar. This process may be regarded as a significant democratic procedure reflecting representation, inclusiveness, and unity.

The Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker declared Senior General Min Aung Hlaing from the group

of Pyithu Hluttaw representatives who won the largest number of valid votes was elected as the President. He also announced that U Nyo Saw and Nan Ni Ni Aye were elected as Vice-Presidents.

With the establishment of 31 Union-level ministries, including those dedicated to women's affairs and youth affairs, the new government is poised to enhance the role of women and young people in national progress. These developments represent positive momentum, and the formation of the new government in the new year is warmly welcomed as a step towards a peaceful, modern, and developed nation.

The Federal Balance: Peace and the Union

stood. Originally, it meant that all ethnic groups would live together in unity, sharing both success and hardship equally. However, misinterpretations and narrow views by some leaders have contributed to internal conflicts.

In reality, arguing about whether the country is called a "Union" or "Federal" is less important. What really matters is how power is shared fairly between the central government and the states.

Looking back at history, the Panglong Conference(ပင်လုံညီလာခံ) was not fully inclusive. It mainly involved leaders from the Bamar, Shan, Kachin, and Chin groups. Other groups, like Kayin and Kayah, were only observers. So, while it created a spirit of unity, it did not fully solve how the country should be organized.

There is a close connection between federal principles and the constitution. There is also a strong link between peace and how the union is built. The current system of seven states, seven regions, and self-administered zones is a practical structure.

In reality, no state belongs to only one ethnic group. For example, Shan State is not only for Shan people, and Ayeyawady Region is not only for Bamar people. People from different ethnic groups live across the country.

The structure of the Amyotha Hluttaw (House of Nationalities), which gives representation based on population, is reasonable. Giving equal representation to all states, regardless of size, may not work well in practice.

Also, the seven states and seven regions have equal status, and each has its own legislative body with some level of autonomy. Under the 2008 Constitution, 25 per cent

of parliamentary seats are reserved for the military. This is intended to support a stable and disciplined democratic transition and protect national unity. Myanmar's history shows that weak understanding of democracy and political misuse led to instability in the past. Therefore, the military continues to play a role as a stabilizing force.

If people and leaders do not fully understand federalism, it may lead to confusion and instability. Moving from a centralized system to a federal one is complex and requires careful understanding and cooperation from all sides.

If civil society and the public do not understand federal principles, there is a risk of weakening the union. It is important to recognize that staying united brings more benefits than breaking apart.

The government is working to meet the needs of all ethnic groups as long as national unity is maintained. Now is a good time for

all groups to move beyond mistrust and work together through dialogue.

Federalism is suitable for countries with many ethnic groups and large territories. However, it must be handled carefully. Its success depends on the wisdom, openness, and cooperation of leaders and people.

For Myanmar, which is still developing, poorly managed federalism could worsen existing problems. A strong and stable federal

system can only be built through compromise, dialogue, and mutual understanding.

Myanmar is located between major global powers, so careful use of federal principles is important for national security and development. Ultimately, the people want peace, stability, and economic progress. These goals can only be achieved through internal peace and a shared constitutional agreement based on cooperation and trust.

terminals across the Yangon Region and ensuring no delays for ships to avoid extra charges for importers.

discussed systematic storage procedures. Arrangements are being made for staff to remain on standby to receive incoming oil shipments.

Yangon steps up breath tests, tightens traffic rules for Thingyan

THE Thingyan Festival period in Yangon will see motorists subjected to checks using alcohol testing devices (breathalyzers), according to the Yangon Region Government.

During the Thingyan Festival, drivers in Yangon Region are prohibited from drink-driving, reckless or disorderly racing, and dangerous manoeuvring on the roads. It is also banned to operate vehicles with removed exhaust pipes, without number plates, with fake or substituted number plates, or with doors or rear covers removed.

In addition, drivers are required to carry valid driving licences and vehicle registration documents. They are also prohibited from driving deregistered old vehicles, unregistered vehicles, or vehicles under repair. Likewise, the mounting of international flags on vehicles, carrying loads beyond the designated weight limit in pickup trucks, and riding motorcycles or side-

car motorcycles within the Yangon City Development Committee area are not permitted.

Failure to comply with these regulations will result in effective legal action under existing laws. Drivers will be tested with breathalyzers, and those found to have consumed alcohol will face legal penalties.

At present, CCTV cameras have been installed at major junctions and traffic lights, and traffic violations will be prosecuted using recorded footage, the Yangon Region government has announced. — ASH/MKKS

Myanmar Daily Weather Report

BAY INFERENCE: The weather has a few clouds over the North Andaman Sea and Central Bay of Bengal and is partly cloudy to cloudy over the South Andaman Sea and elsewhere over the Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 10 April 2026: The weather will be partly cloudy in Yangon, Bago and Ayeyawady regions. Rain or thundershowers will be fairly widespread in Upper Sagaing Region and Kachin and Chin States, scattered in Mandalay and Lower Sagaing regions and (northern and eastern) Shan State and isolated in the remaining Regions and States. The degree of certainty is 80 per cent.

THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay, Magway, Sagaing and Taninthayi regions and Kachin, Chin, Rakhine and Shan states. In the area along the cumu-

lonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hails may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance of these phenomena.

STATE OF THE SEA: The sea will be slight to moderate in Myanmar waters. Wave height will be about 4-6 feet off and along the Myanmar Coasts.

OUTLOOK FOR THE SUBSEQUENT TWO DAYS: Likelihood of isolated to scattered rain or thundershowers in Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay, Upper Sagaing and Taninthayi regions and Kachin, Kayin, Chin, Mon, Rakhine and Shan states.

FORECAST FOR NAY PYI TAW AND NEIGHBOURING AREA FOR 10 April 2026: Likelihood of isolated rain or thundershowers. Degree of certainty is 60 per cent.

FORECAST FOR YANGON AND NEIGHBOURING AREA FOR 10 April 2026: Partly cloudy. — DMH

CNG vehicles required to undergo annual inspection

THE Ministry of Energy declared that CNG vehicles which have not undergone annual inspection and CNG cylinder testing will be permanently removed from the CNG vehicle list starting from 1 May. The Automotive Natural Gas Department of Myanma Oil and Gas Enterprise, operated under the Ministry of Energy, has been opening CNG filling stations in Yangon Region, Paleik in Mandalay Region, and Chauk and Yenangyoung townships in Magway Region to provide affordable natural gas to vehicles without any holidays and ensure smooth transportation of the people. Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) is natural gas compressed into cylinders at high pressure. If cylinders lack structural integrity, if valves are not secure, or if pipes are not robust, gas leaks can cause fire explosions, potentially harming users. Therefore, to ensure the safety of travellers, the Automotive Natural Gas Department conducts annual inspections with special attention. Only

vehicles that pass the inspection are issued a CNG usage permit book and card that authorizes the vehicle to legally operate using CNG and confirms that the fuel system complies with safety regulations. Furthermore, cylinders that have been in use for five years since their manufacturing date must undertake their first inspection. After the second

five-year period, they undergo a second pressure test. These tests are systematically conducted by the CNG Vehicle Natural Gas Department using proper equipment. For cylinders exceeding 15 years of service life, extensions may be granted based on the manufacturing country and quality assurance, but most cylinders are designated as “Reject” and then destroyed.

Therefore, vehicle owners must conduct the mandatory annual inspections for the safety and security of the public. If an investigation finds that a vehicle owner is using expired cylinders without complying with regulations, the sale of gas to that CNG vehicle will be permanently suspended. Consequently, the Ministry of Energy urges and informs

CNG vehicle owners to contact the CNG Department and carry out annual inspection and cylinder testing by 30 April 2026, to obtain a new CNG purchase book and card. From 1 May 2026, vehicles that have exceeded five years without undergoing annual inspection will be permanently removed from the CNG vehicle list. Regarding vehicles for which the annual inspection was overdue, the following penalties will apply to them: three-month suspension to purchase CNG for one-year overdue, six-month suspension for two years, nine months for three-year expiry, and one year for four-year expiry. During the suspension period, gas will not be sold to those vehicles. The Ministry of Energy notified CNG vehicle owners to strictly adhere to safety inspection programmes conducted by the Automotive Natural Gas Department to ensure safe and secure travel for passengers. — NN/KK

CBM continues to inject dollars into edible oil import sector

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) has been continuously injecting US dollars into the edible oil import sector, with \$750,000 on 8 April in addition to transactions of 3.3 million baht. CBM sold over \$1.22 million to edible oil-importing companies on 7 April. CBM sold over \$2.99 million to edible oil-importing companies and \$260,000 to fuel oil-importing companies on 6 April, in addition to a \$279,000 sale. CBM sold over \$2.48 million to edible oil-importing companies on 3 April, along with transactions of over \$3.24 million and 1.78 million baht. CBM announced on 2 April that it would pump \$49 million into the fuel oil sector. Moreover, CBM also sold \$2.35 million to edible oil-importing companies and \$4.1 million to fuel oil-importing companies on that day, in addition to transactions of over \$7 million and three million baht in the foreign exchange market. In addition to transactions of large amounts of foreign currencies (yuan, dollar, baht) in the foreign exchange market, CBM has been injecting US dollars to stabilize the foreign exchange market and calm the oil prices. CBM sold over \$35 million, 34 million baht

and over three million yuan in February. CBM sold over \$43 million, 65 million baht and over four million yuan in January 2026. CBM injected foreign currencies into the market, with a view to curbing the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March 2024, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate, depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/KK

2nd ASEAN Rice Trade Summit 2026 addresses regional collaboration in rice trade

THE 2nd ASEAN Rice Trade Summit 2026 and Regional Rice Dialogue held on 4 April at Lotte Hotel in Yangon emphasized challenges of farmers, strengthening regional collaboration, enhancing food security and promoting sustainable rice production and trade among the regional countries. Director-General Dr Marlar Myo Nyunt of the Foreign Economic Relations Department under the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations and Director-General Dr Htein Lin of the Myanmar Trade Promotion Organization operated under the Ministry of Commerce, delivered remarks at the opening ceremony. The President of the Myanmar Rice Federation, the Secretary General of Cambodia Rice Federation, the Joint Secretary General

of Lao National Chamber of Commerce and Industry (Lao NCCI) and members, the Honorary President of Thai Rice Exporters Association (TREA), the Chairman of Vietnam Food Association (VFA), and the SS Rice News Founder discussed matters related to challenges of the stakeholders in the rice industry, market situations and future collaborations. MRF and representatives from Cambodia, Laos, Thailand, and Vietnam joined the Regional Rice Dialogue, where they addressed challenges of farmers, including increasing outputs amid high fertilizer prices and energy crisis, trade and investment promotion plans, seed research and development plans, and collaboration in the logistics sector, including better transportation and warehousing. — NN/KK

Disney to cut up to 1,000 jobs: WSJ report

US entertainment and media giant Disney is planning to eliminate as many as 1,000 positions in the coming weeks, The Wall Street Journal reported Wednesday, citing relevant sources. The company is preparing to make the sizable layoffs in one of the first significant moves under its new CEO Josh D’Amaro, said the report, adding that many of the cuts will be in the company’s recently consolidated marketing department. Like many Hollywood studios, Disney has been trying to adjust to the smaller profits it earns from streaming compared with what it used to make in linear television, as well as to diminished box office returns and intense competition from tech companies, according to the report. Disney is also trying to free up money to invest in digital businesses where it sees growth potential, the report said. — Xinhua

Indonesia inaugurates electric bus, truck assembly plant

INDONESIAN President Prabowo Subianto on Thursday inaugurated an electric bus and truck in Magelang, Central Java Province. During the ceremony, Prabowo expressed hope that Indonesia will begin mass production of electric sedans by 2028, as the government intensifies efforts to build a domestic electric vehicle industry. The assembly operation involves local manufacturers, underscoring efforts to build a domestic EV supply chain, local media reported. The Indonesian government has begun phasing out fossil fuel-based official vehicles while promoting the adoption of electric public transportation, including buses, as part of its energy transition strategy. — Xinhua

Proposed citizenship rule for hiring in central Japan sparks controversy

A proposal by a local government in central Japan to reinstate a rule requiring its employees to hold Japanese citizenship is facing controversy after a survey of randomly selected residents to gauge public opinion was limited to Japanese nationals. An ethnic Korean resident in Japan on Wednesday submitted a petition, urging the Mie prefectural government not to publicize the survey results due to the exclusionary manner in which it was carried out. “The official messaging is reinforcing discriminatory attitudes,” the man in his 30s said at a press conference. Last December, Mie Governor Katsuyuki Ichimi said the prefectural government would be reviewing hiring practices from the standpoint of preventing information leakage outside Japan. — Kyodo

Jordan’s national carrier faces operational challenges

ROYAL Jordanian (RJ) Airlines, Jordan’s national flag carrier, has reported on Thursday significant operational impacts due to regional airspace restrictions amid ongoing Middle East tensions, though it maintains approximately 70 per cent of its network functionality. According to RJ statements and reports from Jordan’s state-run Al Mamlaka TV, the carrier continues to operate regularly to destinations with open airspace, including Saudi Arabia, Egypt, Lebanon, Europe, and North America. However, flights to Iraq, Qatar, Bahrain, Kuwait, and Damascus remain suspended. To ensure safety, the airline has rerouted flights southward via Egyptian airspace, avoiding western and northern conflict zones. According to the statement, these alternative paths have increased flight durations by approximately 30 minutes, resulting in a surge in fuel consumption and insurance costs. Consequently, ticket fares have risen by 100 to 150 per cent across global carriers, including RJ, to cover these additional overheads. — Xinhua

Iran's president discusses US truce with Azerbaijani, French counterparts

Iranian President Masoud Pezeshkian on Wednesday exchanged views with his Azerbaijani and French counterparts on the ceasefire between his country, the United States and Israel.

In a phone call with Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev, Pezeshkian highlighted Iran's deep distrust of the US government owing to its track record of "betraying diplomacy" and attacking the country two times over the past months in the middle of bilateral nuclear negotiations. — Xinhua

FMs of Saudi Arabia, Iran discuss easing tensions

Saudi Foreign Minister Prince Faisal bin Farhan bin Abdullah received a phone call from Iranian Foreign Minister Abbas Araghchi, the Saudi Foreign Ministry said Thursday.

During the phone conversation, the two sides reviewed the latest regional developments and discussed ways to reduce tensions and restore security and stability, said the ministry on platform X. — Xinhua

Israel approves reopening of Karish gas field following ceasefire

The Israeli Ministry of Energy and Infrastructure said in a statement on Thursday it had approved the restart of operations at the Karish gas field, the country's third-largest, located in the Mediterranean Sea off its northern coast.

The field, operated under a state licence by London-based energy company Energean, was shut down on 28 February at the start of the US-Israeli attack on Iran.

Israel's largest natural gas field, Leviathan, was also temporarily halted but resumed operations last week. — Xinhua

US military to remain deployed around Iran

President Donald Trump on Wednesday (local time) said that

the US military deployments will remain in place around Iran until the "real agreement" reached is fully complied with.

"All US Ships, Aircraft, and Military Personnel, with additional Ammunition, Weaponry, and anything else that is appropriate and necessary for the lethal prosecution and destruction of an already substantially degraded Enemy, will remain in place in, and around, Iran, until such time as the REAL AGREEMENT reached is fully complied with. If for any reason it is not, which is highly unlikely, then the "Shootin' Starts," bigger, and better, and stronger than anyone has ever seen before," Trump said in a post on Truth Social. — ANI

Vance: Open Hormuz or ceasefire ends

As Iran accused Israel of breaking the temporary ceasefire terms, US Vice-President JD Vance reiterated Washington's stance that Lebanon was not included in the ceasefire deal and warned that President Donald Trump "will not abide by the terms" if Tehran doesn't reopen the Strait of Hormuz.

Speaking with the reporters outside of Air Force Two as he

left Hungary, Vance said, "We are seeing signs that the Straits are starting to reopen... The deal is a ceasefire, a negotiation — that's what we give — and what they give is that the Straits are going to be reopened. If we don't see that happening, the President is not going to abide by our terms if the Iranians are not abiding by their terms." — ANI

Japan mulls extra 20-day worth of oil release

Japan is considering an additional release of its oil reserves providing 20 days of domestic consumption in May, as uncertainties remain over safe passage through the Strait of Hormuz even with the US-Iran ceasefire, a source close to the matter said Thursday.

The United States and Iran agreed to a conditional two-week ceasefire on Tuesday, shortly before the expiry of US President Donald Trump's self-imposed deadline for Tehran to reopen the Strait of Hormuz or face the destruction of its critical infrastructure. — Kyodo

Trump questions NATO reliability after talks with Rutte

Croke Park boss eager to stage Fury-Joshua heavyweight clash in Dublin

The duo have almost got into the same ring on several occasions, only for contract disputes, fitness

issues and losses elsewhere to derail previous attempts to stage the super-fight. Their camps had reportedly been close to an agreement before Joshua decided to take time out from boxing following a car crash which led to the death of two close friends in December. The 36-year-old Joshua, however, is now back in training and was present for Derek Chisora's defeat by Deontay Wilder last Saturday. Croke Park, with a capacity of over 80,000 in the Irish capital, is one of Europe's largest stadiums. — AFP

THAILAND'S Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul delivered his government's policy statement to parliament on Thursday, prioritizing immediate economic relief from global energy shocks while laying the groundwork for long-term structural reforms.

Addressing the National Assembly, Anutin emphasized that the Bhumjaithai Party-led government will urgently shield citizens and businesses from the severe volatility in global oil and natural gas prices triggered by the ongoing conflict and maritime disruptions in the Middle East.

He said immediate actions include providing help to vulnerable groups affected by rising fuel costs, stabilizing prices for essential agricultural and industrial supplies, and accelerating the disbursement of the 2026 fiscal budget to inject liquidity into the economy. To further boost domestic consumption, Anutin said the incoming administration will drive the co-payment economic stimulus scheme and implement a comprehensive plan for household debt restructuring aimed at helping citizens and small- to medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) re-enter the credit system.

Beyond crisis management, he outlined a strategic shift to upgrade Thailand's economic engines to escape the middle-income trap with plans to attract foreign investment in future industries such as artificial intelligence, semiconductors, and clean energy. To protect local SMEs, authorities will clamp down on illegal foreign nominee companies and tighten import mechanisms to ensure fair competition for locally manufactured goods, he told a joint parliamentary session. — Xinhua

Iran President says Lebanon truce a key condition for ending war: media

IRANIAN President Masoud Pezeshkian, as reported by ISNA on 9 April 2026, stated that a Lebanon ceasefire is a key condition of Iran's 10-point plan to end the regional

war. In a call with French President Emmanuel Macron, Pezeshkian emphasized this demand, framing the truce as a sign of Iran's commitment to diplomatic res-

olution.

Pezeshkian told French counterpart Emmanuel Macron in a phone call that Tehran's "acceptance of the ceasefire is a clear sign of Iran's responsibility and serious will to resolve conflicts through diplomacy", ISNA said. He added that "establishing a ceasefire in Lebanon has been one of the key conditions of Iran's 10-point plan". Tehran said Wednesday its 10-point plan for securing an end to the war with the United States would require Washington to accept its uranium enrichment program and the lifting of all sanctions.

The Islamic republic claimed victory and said in a statement, released alongside a list of the 10 points published by state media, that the plan would require "continued Iranian control over the Strait of Hormuz, acceptance of enrichment, lifting of all primary and secondary sanctions". — AFP

Iran announces alternative routes in Strait of Hormuz

IRAN on Thursday announced two alternative routes for vessels transiting the Strait of Hormuz, citing risks from sea mines in parts of the vital waterway.

"All vessels intending to transit the Strait of Hormuz are advised to take alternative routes to ensure maritime safety and avoid potential sea mine hazards," Iran's Islamic Revolutionary Guard Corps said in a statement carried by local media.

The move comes as Iran has agreed to temporarily reopen the strait — a key oil shipping lane that typically handles one-fifth of global crude — as part of a two-week truce. — Xinhua
